## Mumps Figure About Normal

The 72 cases of mumps reported last week to the Klamath County Public Health department for this county is not unusual, says Dr. Seth M. Kerron, county health officer.

This figure is not unusual but the report is, said Dr. Kerron, explaining that there are usually this number of cases of mumps this time of year but doctors do not report them to the county health department. This year a special survey was made by the department to keep tab of the situation.

There were 27 new cases of mumps reported this week and most of the cases are in the Weyerhaeuser district, according to the health officer. One new case of pneumonia was reported this week as against two last week and one of scarlet fever where there were two last week, which would indicate that the run of these two communicable diseases is about over for this spring if they were all reported. However, Dr. Kerron pointed out, there were no cases of influenza reported in the county last week and only one this week ending February 28, although many people can count more than that in their own acquaintance.

Pneumonia is most prevalent during March, in most areas, Dr. Kerron said, and will probably be so in Klamath county. This is his first spring in this area.
