KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY—Cloudy with showers tonight, clearing Tuesday. High today 48. Low tonight 26. High Tuesday 38.

WESTERN OREGON—Cloudy with rain in south and showers in north today. Partly cloudy tonight and Tuesday with widely scattered showers tonight. Light to moderate winds tonight, with low of 35 to 40 on coast and 30 to 35 in inland valleys. Afternoon to occasionally fresh southwesterly winds off coast, shifting to northerly and decreasing tonight.

EASTERN OREGON—Partly cloudy in south and mostly cloudy in west, with showers in north tonight. Tuesday partly cloudy. Little change in temperature, with afternoon high of 38 to 45 today and Tuesday. Low tonight 30 to 35.
