

Juckeland To Head Health Unit Here

To make the name of the health association here the same as the state association and the California state association it has been changed to the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Public Health association.

This amendment to the constitution was voted upon at the annual association dinner held at the Willard Saturday night and unanimously carried.

An amendment to one of the articles was also carried by vote, stating the executive committee shall consist of the officers of the association, the auditor past president and the association's representative director on the state board of directors of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health association.

The only change in election of officers was the president's post. H. O. Juckeland, a newcomer to Klamath Falls, was elected to that position. Other officers remained the same with Mrs. E. A. Geary as first vice president; Mrs. Fred Pope of Fort Klamath; second vice president; Mrs. Paul Lewis, third vice president; Robert Ross, treasurer, and Mrs. Ted DeMerritt, secretary.

Family relations, meaning problems between parents and children, go way back to early Egyptian days, said Jay E. McCarthy, consultant in the California bureau of health education. Social, emotional, physical and spiritual health should be accomplished in the child by the time he becomes an adult, McCarthy told association members.

The PTA is an excellent liaison between parents and teachers when they could talk over health problems of the children with cooperation and without resentment, the speaker said. The health department conducts classes, prints pamphlets and shows films with the object of building a healthier community, but the most valuable education comes in the home, he said.

General disease could be controlled if the victim would reveal his contacts to the health officer, the consultant advised, but the health department has to waste time on sleuthing work trying to find these contacts without much help.

There were about 50 persons present. William McKibbin made the welcoming speech and Lawrence Slater acted as chairman of the nominating committee for election and election of officers.

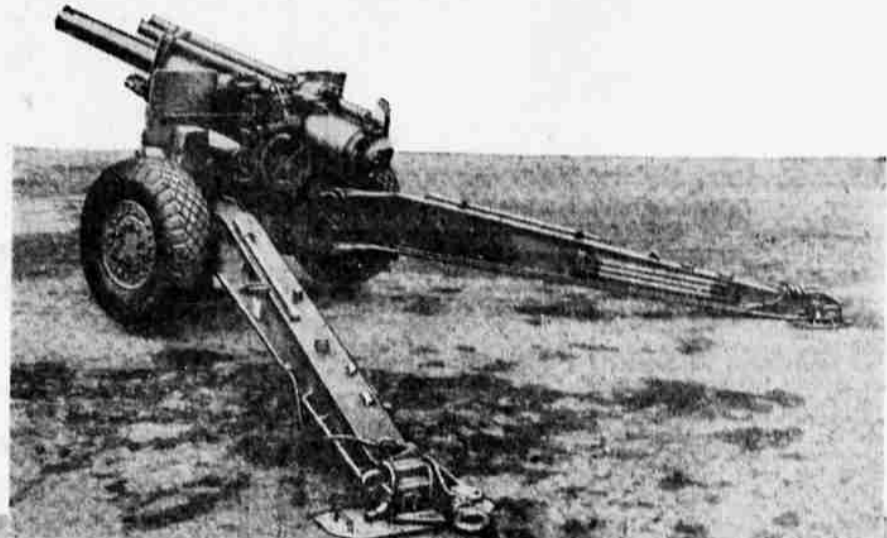

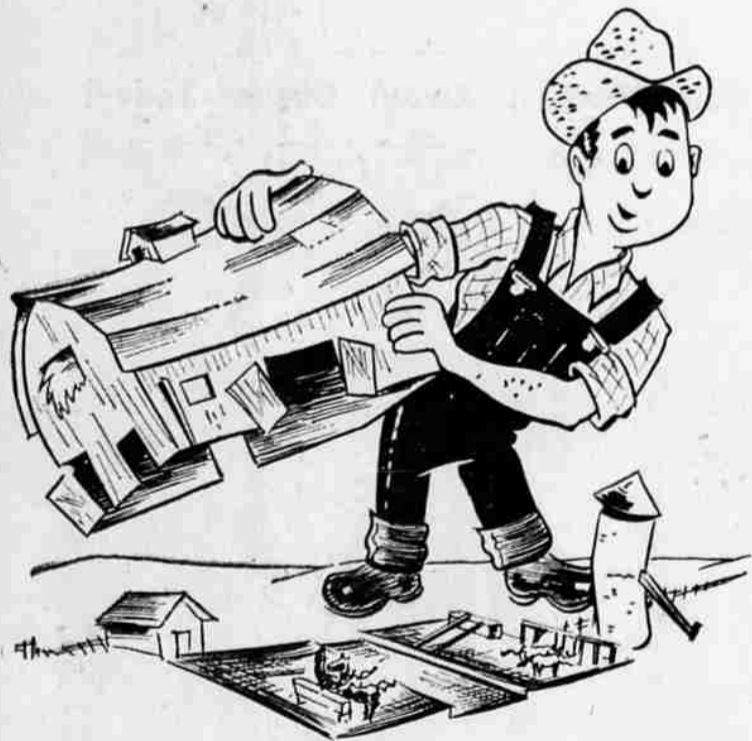
