SEATTLE, March 1 (AP)—Three teams remained in the running today for the Pacific Coast conference's northern division basketball title.

But the fourth place Oregon Ducks will determine the winner.

As the circuit enters its final week, the defending champion Oregon State Beavers hold a game and one-half margin. Washington State and Washington are deadlocked for second.

Oregon State clinched at least a tie for the title by twice striking down the Washington State Cougars in week-end games. But the Beavers, who have lost two of three games with Oregon this season, meet the Ducks in a single tilt on the Oregon floor Saturday night.

Washington State opens a two-game set with Oregon in Eugene tonight. Washington has a pair billed with Idaho in Seattle this weekend.

COLD CLINCH

An Oregon State triumph over Oregon would clinch the title regardless of the outcome of the other series. An Oregon win, however, if USC sweeps its Oregon frays or if USC sweeps its Idaho set, or (2) a three-way tie if both Washington and Washington State mark up double victories.

A loss for either Washington or Washington State would eliminate that club from further consideration.

Oregon State moved into its title-tying position Saturday with a 56-52 win over Washington State. The Beavers, defending coast champions, trailed only once—at 4-3. A roaring rally sent OSC out in front 21-7 and they maintained a 34-26 half-time margin. USC drew within three points twice in the second period but couldn't maintain the pace. USC's Vince Hanson sparked the Cougar threats with 19 points with Cliff Randall leading OSC with 14, all but one tallied in the first half.

PERFECT SEASON

California closes out its Pacific coast conference basketball season, southern division, this week-end with a chance to make a clean sweep of its 12 games for a league record.

California, 10-0, goes up against tallied Stanford, 2-8, in a home and home series.

The day's big surprise came when the Ninth Street Super market of The Dalles turned back Oregon Woolens store, Klamath Falls, 47-42, despite the 17-point high score of Klamath Forward Wilbur Welch.

KAHUT FACES DECISIVE BOUT OF RING CAREER

PORTLAND, March 1 (AP)—Joltin' Joe Kahut comes back to the Oregon ring tomorrow night for a 15-round battle that could be the most crucial in his boxing career.

The 24-year-old Oregonian needs a grand-slam triumph over his rugged opponent, Bobby Zander of Los Angeles, to make the national boxing circuits sit up and take notice.

The preliminaries will see Kahut's younger brother, Tony, exchange punches with Bruce Miller, Chilquin Indian, in a middleweight match due to go four rounds.

In the other four-rounders Bill Carnegie, Portland, meets Dave Davey, Tacoma, Wash., and Sid Jones, Portland, fights Leo Talbot, also of Portland.

STOJACK PLACES BELT ON LINE FRIDAY NIGHT

But it was too good for Ashland to last. The Pelicans got into the act by scoring 24 points in the second period and leading 25-11 at halftime. That was more like it.

Third quarter count was 39-22 and the margin was pushed on up to a solid 25 points for the finish.

Bartenders To Be Licensed July 1

PORTLAND, March 1 (AP)—Oregon bartenders, waiters and waitresses must be licensed after July 1, the state liquor control commission has announced.

The commission said the license will be required for any employee who "participates in any manner in the mixing or serving of alcoholic beverages."

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
