The Klamath Falls Jaycees entertained their employers last night at the annual Bosses Night banquet in the Winema hotel.

Lofton Tatum, Portland lawyer and treasurer of the International Junior chamber of commerce, was the principal speaker of the evening. He said the young men working on the Jaycee projects of civic improvement are getting as fine a business training as could be obtained through many months of formal training. Tatum pointed out that through the handling of a civic program, organization, selection of personnel, selling of the idea, handling the actual program and filling a report at the end of the project, Jaycees are realizing actual business experience and learning to be the community leaders that their bosses are at the present time. As a result, the employer, the community, and the young man are all benefited.

According to Tatum, countries are now represented in the International Junior chamber of commerce and the same ideals of civic and world betterment are carried through at this International congress. The third annual congress will be held in Rio de Janeiro this year.
