

Raiders Post Rough Victory

Jayvees Crush Trojan Five

Southern Oregon college's Red Raiders posted a rough and tumble 52-44 victory in their benefit main event at the KUHS gym last night with the Rickys outfit of the Klamath Basin league.

The slightly speedier Raiders got in the first punch with Bob Hoof's push shot, and from there kept just a jump ahead of the Rickys for most of the first half, out on top of a 25-20 halftime score.

A considerable sharper SOCE quint took the floor in the second half, and fattened up its margin during the opening minutes. The Rickys bounced back, however, and crept up to a 30-32 reading midway of the second half, mainly on the strength of Paul McCall's three pushers from the far corners, only to have the Ashlanders pull out of reach again.

Fouling slowed up the tilt considerably — virtually every rebound scramble ended with a referee's whistle—but the azabaz crowd still seemed to go away satisfied.

Cal Bonney, rangy pivot man for the Raiders, grabbed scoring honors with 15 marks, while Paul McCall, of Rickys, came away with 14.

Preliminary action saw the KUHS Jayvees take a placid 64-26 win from the Sacred Heart Trojans, county tournament runners-up.

Fired up by Skip Johnson's 25 counters, the Jayvees bounced into the initial lead, which was never matched by the Trojan outfit. Quarterly scores were 8-6, 29-16, 45-19 and 64-26.

Giants Awarded Home Run Rings

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 3 (AP) — Festooning a finger of Johnny Mize and each of his New York Giants teammates is a large hunk of gold ring bearing the magic number "221" in bold, raised figures.

The boys are proud of the rings, which President Stuenkel had quarried especially for them after they had belted more home runs last year than anyone in baseball had thought possible.

Their 221 blasts into and over the stands shattered the previous big league record of 182 set by the Yankees of 1936, which had been considered unassailable.

Hall Confers With Sportsmen

TILLAMOOK, March 3 (AP) — Governor Hall conferred here yesterday with coast sportsmen's clubs, chambers of commerce and Isaac Walton representatives on recent coastal stream fishing closures.

Paul Farrera, baseball club attorney, said that the state corporation commissioner had given his final okay on plans of the club and has released money derived from stock sale.
