

## Recreation Topic Of League Program

"The semi-public organization which has recreation on its program is most important in the framework of a youth program," stated Sam Smith, city recreational director, as he sounded the keynote for an excellent program presented by the juvenile welfare committee of the League of Women Voters at the Pelican cafe Wednesday, February 25.

Mrs. Paul Buck is chairman of the committee. He introduced representatives of six of these organizations who in turn explained what their programs were, what their needs were and how they could cooperate with other agencies and the city recreation youth program. Mrs. W. Rowell of the Salvation Army stated that it is primarily a religious organization with a certain amount of time devoted to youth.

Cecil Kollenborn of the YMCA defined his organization as "not a church, not a school, not a recreation center, but a fellowship of individuals growing in body, mind and spirit." He stated that the "Y" is planning a building program for June or July of this year.

Mrs. Frances C. Palmer of the Junior Red Cross stated that their organization was entirely within the framework of the schools, and that members were re-contacting children in foreign lands with textbooks, "scrapbooks," and sending chests of supplies to an entire school rather than to individuals. She also mentioned the Junior Red Cross first aid and water programs. Mrs. Pinner of the Girl Scouts described Girl Scouting as "building future citizens, as the girls of today are the citizens of tomorrow."

Virginia Denton of the Camp Fire Girls stated that the creed of Camp Fire was to lead girls to a full and happy life. She also spoke of the necessity of adult leaders, as did Mrs. Pinner. Chet Hamaker of the Boy Scouts said that Scouting was not an organization but a movement, and further deplored the lack of adult interest and leadership. Mrs. Ralph McNitt, representing the city units of PTA, stated the immediate objective was passage of the levy for recreation on the ballot in the May election, and Mrs. William Gibson described a full and constructive recreational program last summer conducted by the parents and children of Shasta and Altamont PTAs. Bill Proctor, in charge of the Teen-Age club, and working with the city recreation department, stated that the club was now carrying itself for each function, and that his plans for the summer are simple but effective, "to give the kids a place to go and have fun."

Other women's clubs of the city which are interested in a youth program were also represented, including Mrs. C. B. Larkin, president of the Library club, Mrs. Bob Henry, president of Soroptimists, and Mrs. Emmett Chidester, president of the Toastmistress club accompanied by three other members of her group, Mrs. R. F. McLaren, Mrs. Ernest Koschnick and Mrs. Margaret Santo. Members of the hostess club, the League of Women Voters, and several interested visitors made up a group of 43.
