

High School Slates Two Musicals

The music department of Klamath Union high school is preparing two of the finest programs yet presented in Klamath Falls. In past years all musical groups have been crowded into one program which has prevented a full presentation by the various organizations. This year there will be two concerts. The first this coming Friday night in the high school auditorium featuring the high school concert band, the girls glee club, and Madelon Adler as piano soloist with the band.

The band program will include music from Bach to Boogie-Woogie. John Epley, student conductor, is conducting the "Arioso" by John Sebastian Bach.

Madelon Adler, a young artist of exceptional ability is appearing in the first movement of the Grieg Concerto in A minor. The band arrangement for the concerto was arranged by William Heydt, director of the famous University of Michigan band. The girls glee club will also appear on the program in four numbers. In addition to the piano soloist Friday night's concert is featuring the brass sextet, the clarinet quartet, the girls monette, and the drum ensemble.

Students in the music organizations are selling tickets for these concerts, the second of which will be given by the high school orchestra and a cappella choir on Thursday, March 11. Advance ticket sales indicate that crowded houses will be present for both concerts.

Klan Head Pledges Battle

WRIGHTSVILLE, Ga., March 3 (AP)—The grand dragon of the Georgia Ku Klux Klan last night told robed and hooded members of the organization that "blood will flow" in the south if the negro takes a place at the side of white men through the force of federal bayonets.

Dr. Samuel Green of Atlanta addressed the klansmen as they paraded around the square of this Johnson county seat on the eve of a democratic primary to name 10 county officials.

About 300 Ku Kluxers participated in the orderly demonstration. After their parade they burned a 15-foot cross on the courthouse lawn.

About 400 negroes were eligible to join 5200 white persons in today's voting in which nomination is tantamount to election in this democratic stronghold of the deep south. The county has a population of 14,800, including about 4500 negroes.

Negroes stayed away from the voting booths today. Officials said 241 negroes were eligible to vote at polling places at the county courthouse. None had appeared two hours after the polls opened.

Green attacked President Truman's civil rights program, and said "the plan will not permit the people of this country to become a mongrel race."

He was the only hooded klansman at the demonstration.

Canadians Hit By Bus Tie-Up

SPOKANE, March 3 (AP)—The United States almost picked up several new "residents" because of the Northwest Greyhound strike.

Because the Canadian government limits the amount of money a resident can take out of the country, several Canadians were caught without funds for rail fare when buses stopped running last Saturday.

The company, however, refunded the unused ticket price and added enough for the purchase of a return ticket on another line.

In Seattle, William G. Hosie, federal labor conciliator, said yesterday there appears no prospect of an immediate settlement of the strike which is now in its fourth day.

Huge Tax Surplus Seen

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—A former new deal treasury official Tuesday predicted the government will take in nearly \$20,000,000,000 more than it spends this year and next.

"This leaves 'ample room' for a \$5,500,000,000 tax reduction, John W. Hanes, undersecretary of the treasury in 1938-39, told the senate finance committee.

"Surpluses of the size that are now in prospect," the New York corporation executive said in his prepared testimony, "means that the government is taxing the people far beyond its needs." He added:

"Tax laws which steal from the individual the fruits of his labor will produce stagnation in this country just as it has done in England, France, Italy and elsewhere."

Before today's hearing opened, Senator Brewster (R-Me.) predicted the finance committee will vote to cut taxes only by \$4,500,000,000.

Salem To Vote On New Charter

CORVALLIS, March 3 (AP)—Corvallis citizens will vote on a new charter embodying the city manager form of government at a special election to be held sometime in April.

Climaxing several weeks of discussion the city council voted 5-4 Monday night to submit the issue to the people.

Mayor George Peavy said a final revised version of the proposed new charter would be submitted to the council March 15 and then put on the ballot.

Auto Dealers Asked For Cooperation

PORTLAND, March 3 (AP)—Oregon auto dealers have been asked to worry more about problems of the motorist.

George Romney, managing director of the Automobile Manufacturers' association, said inadequate parking space in cities, obsolete highways and traffic safety must be given greater attention by the industry.

Fausett And Coyner Race For Tulelake Council Seat

TULELAKE, March 3—Two separate filings for council seats, each by petition bearing 10 signatures, will be filed before noon Thursday with Mrs. Victoria Thaler, city clerk, signifying intention of two well known business men, one an incumbent, to seek election to council seats next April 13. Three council posts are open.

Ready to place their names on the ballot are Ralph B. Fausett, mayor for the last two years, an independent up for re-election and E. L. Coyner, republican.

Fausett owns and operates the Fausett Electric shop.

Coyner, who has made his home here for four years is a graduate of Oregon State college, lived at Newberg, Ore., and prior to coming here was superintendent of schools

at Bonanza for 13 years. He is owner of the Coyner Variety store.

Charles Card and R. N. Rina-barger, whose names have been prominently mentioned as potential candidates for the council have not yet indicated that they will file.

Councilmen W. R. Moore and Clarence Schott whose terms expire both have decided not to run for re-election.

Two councilmen are to be elected for four-year terms and one for a two-year term.
