## Art Group To Take Over Old Building Here

The acceptance of a building from the city for an art gallery, meeting place and work shop, was part of the business of the Klamath art association Tuesday night.

The group met at the office of Sheldon Brumbaugh, architect in Pine Grove with Verne Swansen, president, conducting the business meeting which was followed by a talk by the Rev. F. C. Wisenbach. The building which was offered by the city for the use of the association on the condition that it be vacated within 30 days if requested, is a historical landmark in this county. Made of stone with thick walls, the building located between Central and the Link river bridge on Main street was used as the first federal post office in this region. Afterward it was used at various times as a jail, a doctor's office, a commercial building, a law office and a dwelling.

The art association plans to fix up the building and landscape the grounds and a work party made up of volunteer members will do the job, it was agreed. It is hoped that the work of refurbishing the property will be completed by early April when open house will be held. Anxious to get to work on a project, the junior group of the association is eyeing the possibilities of pushing a clean street campaign to beautify the city. Robert Banister, advisor for this group, will outline the campaign in the near future.

A report from Mrs. A. D. Burnett on the recent art exhibit in Portland was heard.

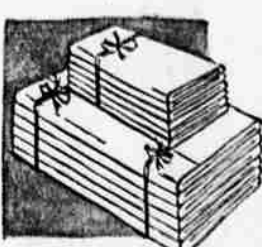
