Excavation Completed For Wiard Swimming Pool As Work Pushed On Project

With the excavation completed for the swimming pool in Wiard Memorial park in the south suburban district, young fry, and oldsters too, are already having visions of a dip on a hot summer day.

Power equipment and time were donated last week by Louis Richardson of the Hager district to excavate for the pool, the filtration system and the drainage. Fuel to operate the shovel was donated by Elmer Balsiger.

Plans, prepared by Clifford Jay, of the office of Sheldon Brumbaugh, call for a pool 45 by 105 feet with graduated depth from 3 to 9 feet. A walk way will circle the water area. The water will be heated. The pool is to be located at the end of Peck drive on Hager street, adjacent to the proposed recreational building.

It is planned to cover the pool at some future time to provide for year around use. The excavation has been fenced to prevent accidents.

The pool will be built to state board of health specifications and when completed will meet all requirements for public safety.

This is only part of the big overall park project that got under way last fall with the acquisition of 30 acres of land from Klamath county. Donations from people of Klamath Falls and surrounding communities made possible the purchase price of \$3800.

It is estimated that more than \$12,000 has already been contributed to the project which will bring the first children's playground and recreation spot to this suburban district.

The grounds have been landscaped and planted to trees and shrubbery. Lawn will be seeded in the near future, banks of earth have been leveled to provide parking space for cars, and playground equipment, benches and tables for the comfort of the public is being readied.

Harry L. Wiard for whom the park is named has given much of his time in the past several months soliciting donations and to the landscaping and installations of the underground irrigation system.

Later plans call for construction of a hollow tile recreation hall, 40 by 70 feet, facing Hope street. It will be made available for community gatherings and it is hoped that construction can get under way this year. Some materials are already on the ground.

Since some program must be worked out for perpetual maintenance of the park, it is proposed to form a park district. Petitions will be circulated in the next few weeks which will acquaint residents and property owners of the suburban district with the plan. These petitions in turn to go to the county court, in turn to go to the county court, provided that 25 per cent of the qualified voters signify approval of the plan by signing.

The court will then call a public hearing and a special election can then be scheduled.

The park district would function on the same plan as the rural fire district allowed by residents of the south suburbs some months ago.

Attorney H. O. Merryman is donating his time in preparing the documents relative to the proposed park district boundaries.

The suggested area is from Washburn way on the west; north to Freida street; south to Anderson; east from Madison to Hilyard; east on Hilyard to Patterson; north to Climax; west to Madison, and north again to Freida.

The tax levy, it is stated, probably would not exceed one mill.

It is planned to dedicate the park to the Klamath Falls post, American Legion, raised on a 30-foot pole delivered by Hal Ogle of the KPFA and the Legion. The dedication, it is planned, will be under the direction of Mrs. Hal Ogle, president of the post auxiliary.

The park board draws attention to glass containers which have been placed in business houses in Klamath Falls and the south suburbs in which donations may be dropped by anyone interested in the development of the park.

ASTORIA, March 4 (AP)—The lumber freighter Kelso Victory finally sailed for Seattle after a dispute over fresh eggs that delayed the departure four days.

Waterfront spokesmen told this story: The deck crew refused to sail without fresh eggs on the menu. The quartermaster complained he could not find them fresh enough. The captain fired the deck crew.

Then the other crewmen protested the dismissal. The captain fired them also. While a new crew came from Portland, the ship remained at its berth, preventing loading of two other vessels.

Just before the Kelso sailed yesterday, the quartermaster reported he had located fresh eggs and they would be on the menu.

Swamp Fever Check Made In Oregon

SALEM, March 4 (AP)—Oregon agriculture officials are on the alert for any signs of an increase in swamp fever, but there has been no serious outbreak complained of.

M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the state division of animal industry, said Tuesday. Knickerbocker said his division has been on the alert for several weeks because Washington and other states have reported increases.

Swamp fever is a serious disease affecting horses.

"Oregon always has had a few cases, but we have so far been successful in isolating them. There now are just the normal number of cases. That is, just a few sporadic cases," Knickerbocker said.

Flagg Seeking Secretary Of State Position

A warm contest for the republican nomination for secretary of state appeared certain today with the announcement by George Flagg that he will run against Earl Newberry, the incumbent.

Flagg resigned as state public utilities commissioner to make the race for state secretary. Here is his announcement:

"The administrative responsibilities of the secretary of state for the various divisions within his department and the even greater responsibilities as a member of the board of control, where he has joint supervision of the expenditure of many millions of dollars, place a definite premium on the value of experience in state work.

"For more than nine years I was privileged to serve as chief deputy, the chief administrative officer of the department, under Secretaries P. J. Stadelman, Earl Snell and Robert S. Farrell Jr. I then accepted another major appointment as public utilities commissioner, by

Governor Snell in 1943 and was re-appointed in 1947.

"I believe that my state training and experience qualify me for the office of secretary of state, and it is in that position I can be of greatest service. I will, therefore, be a candidate for the republican nomination on May 21."
