Rhythm Band—Women of the Moose will practice Friday from 4:30 to 5:30.

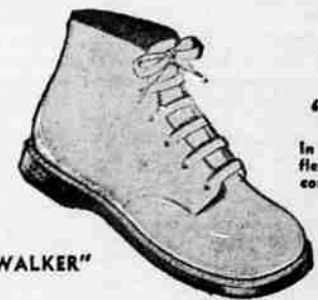
ARMY SEARCHES FOR ESCAPED PRISONERS

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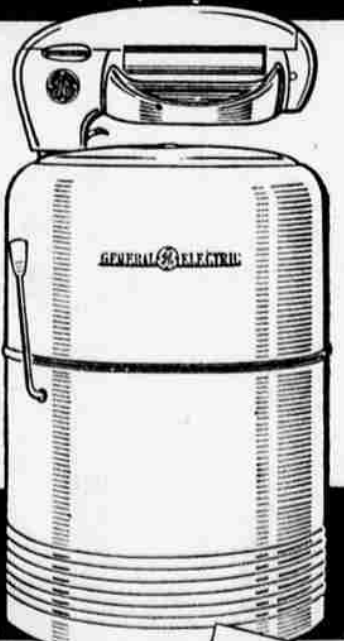
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
