

Basin Pioneer Passes At 70

PIONEER COMMUNITY, March 4.—Death of a beloved Klamath county matron, Mrs. Fannie Bell Talbot, 70, was learned here today with the passing of the lifelong resident of this section at her home here at 10:30 p. m. last night.

Mrs. Talbot was born at Worden on February 25, 1878, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel L. Gordon Sr., early day residents of that section. She was married to Henry Asabel Talbot, pioneer, and he died December 12, 1944. For 36 years the family resided in the Pioneer Community.

Mrs. Talbot is survived by four daughters, Mrs. M. L. (Nellie) Lull, of Pioneer Community; Mrs. A. O. (Blanche) Mott, of Pioneer Community; Mrs. H. F. (Hildred) Sawyer, both of Klamath Falls; and Mrs. R. E. (Marie) Harlan, Lakeview; one son, Reuben Talbot of Pioneer Community, and 11 grandchildren. In addition there are two sisters, Mrs. Nellie McCormick of Keno and Mrs. Mae Klingner of Coos Bay, and two brothers, Lyle Gordon of Roseville, Calif., and Henry Gordon of Dorris, Calif.

Final rites for Mrs. Talbot will be conducted at 1:30 p. m. Saturday from the Earl Whitlock chapel with interment in the old Gordon cemetery at Worden.

Chamber Backs UMT Proposal

Chamber of commerce members have voted 56 to 21 in favor of universal military training in a poll conducted by the national affairs committee. A large number of the members failed to vote in the balloting, result of which will be reported to the Oregon congressional delegation.

Dave Totten discussed the national guard recruiting campaign at today's chamber directors meeting, and Director Winston Purvine outlined plans for Friday's "Introduction Day" at OVS. Purvine announced that OVS has gained from 270 students on January 5 to 473 this week.

Czech Quits Embassy Post

WASHINGTON, March 4.—(AP)—Czech Ambassador Juraj Slavik resigned his post Wednesday to "fight for a free Czechoslovakia."

Slavik announced at the embassy that he is sending his formal resignation to the new communist-led government at Prague.

He said he also is informing the state department of his action.

At a news conference, Slavik said he is convinced that Dr. Eduard Benes, Czechoslovak president, was under "duress and terror" when he agreed to formation of the new communist government headed by Premier Klement Gottwald.

The envoy did not say what he proposed to do in his "fight for a free Czechoslovakia."

"But," he said, "I am confident I don't stand alone."

Slavik has been ambassador since June, 1946. He was twice minister of interior in Czech government, holding that post during the war in the London exile government.

KF Men Set For Road Meet

Klamath Falls and Dorris will be represented at a meeting called for Monday, next, Monday for organization of a U. S. Highway 97 association.

T. B. Watters, chairman of the roads and highways committee of the Klamath County chamber of commerce, will head the local delegation. Malcolm E. Epley, director in charge of the committee, and Manager Charles Stark are others who will go from here, while Dorris will name a representative in a day or two to accompany the local men.

It is possible other Klamath communities on No. 97 may also be represented.

Oregon Spuds Make Big Impression

Two boxes of Klamath potatoes, donated by Troy Cook, proved highly successful door prizes at a recent meeting of the Oregon State society in Washington, D. C., according to word from society officers, the Klamath chamber of commerce.

Grace Low, society secretary, wrote that the excellence of the potatoes proved Oregon could "push Idaho around" in the potato situation.

The society is made up of Oregonians and former Oregonians stationed or living in the national capital.

Tule Homesteaders Ask Extension Of Mail Route

TULELAKE, March 4.—An application for an extension of the present rural mail route has been made by the 1947 homesteaders to the post office department in Washington, D. C., through Mrs. Wanda Stark, postmaster.

It is probable, Mrs. Stark stated Wednesday that a new route, hanging on future road conditions will be granted instead of an extension which would make the route, only one out of Tulelake, approximately 100 miles long.

An inquiry on road conditions from the postal department has been received.

At present only the main east-west roads into the homestead area have been gravel surfaced. North-south roads are still dirt. Graveling was accomplished with a \$10,000 appropriation from Modoc county, allowed several months ago.

Clinton Fulcher, Modoc county supervisor, who met recently with the homesteaders to discuss the road situation in both the area where the 1947 homesteaders and those to be opened this year are located gave no assurance that an intensive road program can be undertaken until clauses of the Collier-Burns bill are clarified.

It is possible that Modoc county may get \$100,000 under provisions of this bill and from the forest service beginning July 1.

Distribution of that fund, if it develops must be worked out, either sharing equally, regardless of population or as an alternative allocation to be spent over the county without regard to districts.

District 5 in which Tulelake is located received \$20,000 in the 1947 county budget plus a \$10,000 special allocation. Fulcher will seek an increase this year.

Barge Blast Shakes Town

UMATILLA, Ore., March 4.—Explosion of a Columbia river tanker barge shook Umatilla Wednesday.

The barge was the ill-fated "Pendleton" which twice before had exploded. Three workmen aboard the craft at time of the blast were thrown into the water but miraculously escaped injury.

Flames, ignited by a spark, were blamed for the series of four explosions which hurled pieces of the barge, some of which weighed six tons or more, as far away as 500 feet from the scene.

The barge, a 280,000-gallon tanker owned by Tidewater-Shaver company of The Dalles, was being repaired at time of the blast. Last June a similar blast wrecked it here and earlier in the year it figured in an explosion at Portland.

No Vegetables For Alimony

SAN JOSE, Calif., March 4.—Vegetable Packer Sam Lobue told the divorce court it would be impossible for him to pay his wife \$140 a month alimony.

However, he could let her take it out in vegetables.

Her attorney argued that would put Lobue in the position of dictating her diet—broccoli today, beans tomorrow, and the like.

"My clients needs money, not rutabagas," said the attorney.

Judge Leonard R. Avila agreed. He ordered Lobue to pay \$110 a month in cash pending the divorce action.

Any vegetables Lobue contributed would be without judicial credit.

British Ships Head For Africa

LONDON, March 4.—The admiralty announced Wednesday that two British ships are steaming from Simonstown, South Africa to the African gold coast colony, scene of widespread rioting.

Fourteen persons were killed and 140 wounded Saturday when a mob of 50,000 swept through the capital city of Accra, looting shops and battling police.

The British government announced Monday "there was almost certainly communist incitement" behind the disorders.
