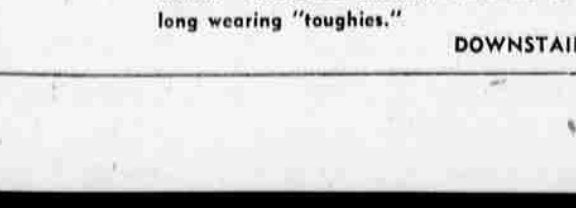

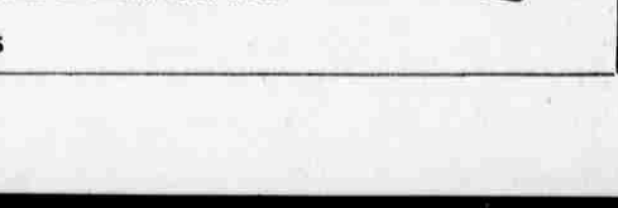


Extension Unit News

Recreation Chairman Mrs. C. Kendall.

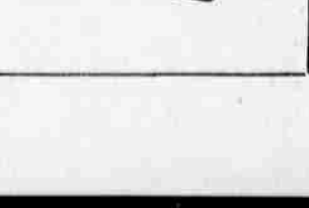
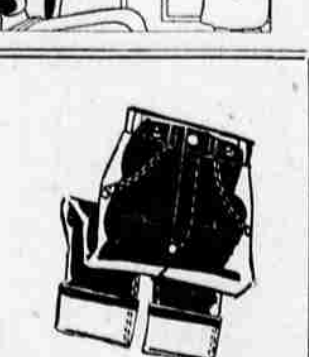
