Department Of Commerce Hangs On To Loyalty Record

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—The commerce department stuck by its guns today and refused again to hand over to the house un-American activities committee its loyalty records on Dr. Edward U. Condon.

John L. Towne, secretary of the department's loyalty board, came before the committee in response to a subpoena directing that he show up with the papers.

But he didn't have the papers. Nor would he answer questions about them.

Secretary of Commerce Harriman advised the committee by letter last night that the records would not be turned over to the congress members. He said that to do so would be "prejudicial" to the public interest.

This was the situation: 1. Committee members talked of asking congress to pass a law forcing Harriman to surrender the papers.

2. Harriman's stand "as lambasted by speeches on the house floor by Reps. McKinnon (R-Minn.), Hoffman (R-Mich.) and Rich (R-Pa.)."

Rich said: "The only way we will ever get anything of benefit out of those bureaus downtown is to clean house—next November."

3. An un-American activities subcommittee recommended that the full committee hold formal public hearings on the case of Condon, director of the national bureau of standards.

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—How to keep roads around cities open if the West Coast is bombed is under study by the federal roads officials.

Commissioner Thomas H. MacDonald of the public roads administration told the senate appropriations committee today his agency is looking into the situation, particularly in Washington and Oregon. "We want to determine what patterns are going to be necessary to develop roads around the metropolitan areas in case of danger of bomb attacks," he said.
