Rev. Tweet Moves Here

Rev. Irvin Tweet of Brush Prairie, Wash., has accepted a call to become pastor of the Klamath Lutheran church, Cross and Crescent.

Rev. Tweet is expected to arrive sometime in late May. He succeeds the Rev. H. M. Topness, who recently became pastor of the Fjeldberg Lutheran church in Huxley, Ia. Temporary pastor of Klamath Lutheran is the Rev. H. J. Thorpe, who will be in the pulpit until Rev. Tweet arrives.

Rev. Thorpe's sermon this Sunday morning at 11 o'clock will be on the theme, "Seeking the Christ." The senior choir will sing the anthem, "My God and Father While I Stray," by G. W. Maclellan. Mrs. A. H. Denison will be at the organ.

Sunday school and Bible class meets at 9:45 a. m. Classes for all ages are offered.

Church Builds New Wing

Construction began on the educational building of the First Baptist church, 8th and Washington streets, Thursday morning, according to an announcement by the pastor, G. C. Brown.

The new educational wing adjoining the auditorium was extensively damaged by the fire last Monday morning. Contractor Joe A. Jones expects to have the wing rebuilt in about six weeks. The project had just been finished and was ready for occupancy when the fire occurred.

The members had donated part of the work during the winter. The church feels that only the efficiency of the local fire department saved the main auditorium.

While the opening of the building will necessarily be delayed several weeks, plans for the Sunday school enlargement campaign, with Dr. E. B. Evans in charge, will go forward. Dr. Evans, with a corps of trained workers, will lead the local church in a Sunday school training course March 14 through March 19. Dr. Evans will speak at both services on March 14.

SEC Recommends \$910,352 In Fees

PORTLAND, March 5 (AP)—The securities and exchange commission has recommended \$910,352 in fees and \$33,614 expenses for trustees and attorneys in the reorganization of Portland Electric Power company.

This was about \$500,000 less than the sums requested. The commission's recommendation was placed before Estes Snedecor, special master in bankruptcy, who will turn them over, together with his findings, to federal court for a final decision.

Grand National Show Slated

The Junior Grand National, annual livestock classic for Western youth, will be held in San Francisco's huge Cow Palace March 20 to 25.

It is expected to attract around 1000 PFA and 4-H club boys and girls with 2500 head of livestock. The six days of livestock exhibition, judging, auction sales and a spectacular Centennial arena pageant are expected to attract 50,000 urban dwellers to the exposition.

Sheep shearing will be a full-scale contest this year, sponsored by the California Wool Growers' association and will be open to all youngsters exhibiting livestock. This contest is scheduled daily just before the pageant. An electric sheep shearing outfit will be awarded to both the PFA and 4-H club champion.

Two seniors, Ruthie Huston and Cameron Stewart, have been chosen by a committee of faculty and radio personnel, to match their wits in a quiz tournament. They will compete with seniors from the neighboring schools, Malin, Dorris, and such. The first round will be broadcast over KFJL, March 9.

Cameron and Ruthie are both well qualified to represent KU with the "smarties," as they have done outstanding scholastic work throughout high school. Cameron is salutatorian with a grade average of 1.212 and Ruthie ranks 7th in the class with a 1.515 average.

Public Shooting Held Embarrassing

PEIPING, March 5 (AP)—Machuborn Princess Yoshiko Kawashima, sentenced to die for espionage, said today she would be "greatly embarrassed" if executed in public.

She asked to be shot in private and without fanfare.

The princess was called the "Mata Hari of Asia" at her trial last fall.

She said she did not want to be shot at Peiping's Bridge of Heaven—a spacious plaza between the Alta. of Heaven and the Temple of Heaven, a favorite sightseeing spot.

"Only real traitors and other criminals are usually shot there," the princess told her lawyers.

Portland Slates School Tax Vote

PORTLAND, March 5 (AP)—Two school tax levy measures will be on the ballot for Portland voters at the primary election May 21.

The school board decided last night to submit to voters a proposed \$1,700,000 special levy for maintenance and operation of the schools.

A week earlier they decided to put on the ballot a proposed 10-year levy of \$2,500,000 for construction and repair of buildings.

DP Study To Be Made Soon

SALEM, March 5 (AP)—Governor John H. Hall said today he would appoint a commission to determine how many European displaced persons Oregon could support.

The committee will ask church, farm, labor and women's organizations how many refugees they could house and find jobs for. Results of the survey will be sent to Oregon's representatives in congress.

The governor said "We have to take care of our own people first," adding that the state's own economy must be considered. He said it wouldn't be right to have refugees take jobs away from Oregon residents.

Father Alcius Helbel, Portland, who called on the governor, said congress will do nothing about the displaced persons in Europe unless Americans make it known they have jobs and housing for thousands of refugees.

W. Linkenbach Dies At 86

William Linkenbach, 86-year-old former Klamath Falls resident, but for the last 12 years making his home at Sumner, near Coos Bay, Ore., died suddenly shortly after dinner last night, according to word received here. Mr. Linkenbach was residing with a daughter, Mrs. Walter Phillips of Sumner.

Final rites will be held Monday at 1:30 p. m. from the Whitlock chapel with interment in Klamath Memorial park. Mr. Linkenbach was born July 9, 1862, in Lawrenceburg, Ind. His father was a veteran of the Civil War. The Linkenbachs came here in 1907 from Los Angeles and Mr. Linkenbach followed the carpentry trade. He built many homes in this section and handled much of the interior work of the Pelican theatre. Mrs. Linkenbach preceded her husband in death 25 years ago. Survivors include two sons, Jack and Eugene of this city and one daughter, Mrs. Phillips of Sumner. There is one grandchild.
