

Arab Army Takes Over Nablus Area

DAMASCUS, Syria, March 5 (AP)—Fawzi Bey Al Kauki has established headquarters of his Arab volunteer army in the Nablus area of Northern Palestine.

An official source here said the Arabs now "control all Eastern Palestine from Safad to Hebron." (This would be a strip 100 miles long extending from the Far North to an area south of Jerusalem.)

Fawzi Bey and his headquarters company rode into Palestine during the night. They joined Arab concentrations surrounding Tzus in the mountains north of Nablus. Fawzi Bey reported to his Damascus headquarters that his "invasion" was completed without incident.

Haganah said 30 Arabs were killed and many were wounded in a four-hour battle with Jews last night on the plains of Sharon between Tel Aviv and Haifa.

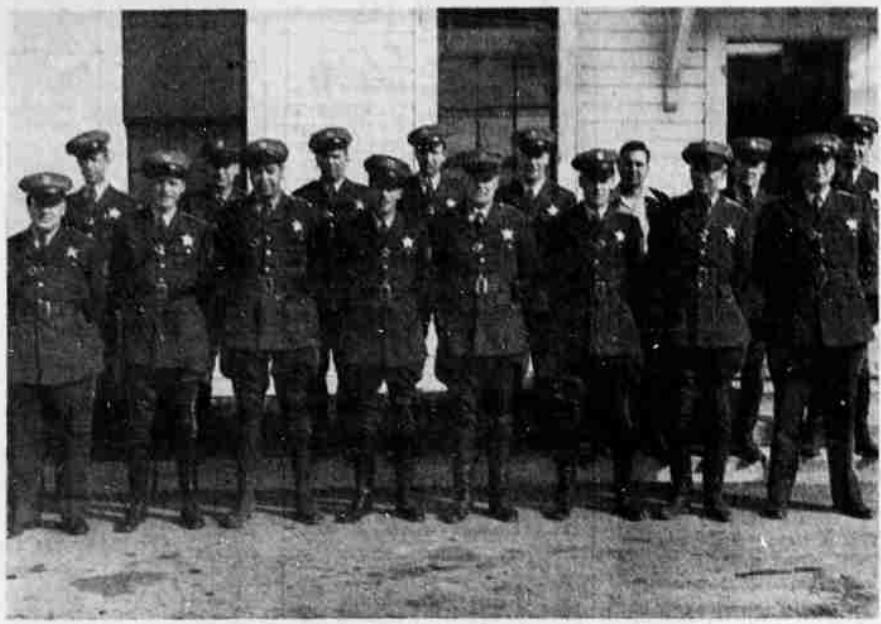
The battle erupted when Arabs attacked a Jewish settlement at Magd-el on the Tel Aviv-Haifa highway, said a communique of the Jewish militia issued in Tel Aviv.

Palestine Chief Rabbi D. Isaac Halevy Herzog urged the United Nations security council to carry out the terms of the general assembly's decision on partition of the Holy Land. He asked the council in a statement made public here to "realize the momentous moral issue involved... whether mankind shall fulfill the inner summons of its conscience or shall succumb to political expediency."

An Arab staff officer here said Fawzi Bey plans to consolidate large Arab forces surrounding Nazareth, Safad, Jenin, Nablus and the hill country southward toward Jerusalem. He will carry out feeler operations against Jews on the coastal plain, the officer added.

"Present operations," the officer said, "constitute the secondary phase of the overall strategy—testing the enemy's strength."

Grimditch Divorce OK'd

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 5 (AP)—Gloria Barker Grimditch, pretty 23-year-old Gould heiress, today was granted a divorce from William Henry Grimditch Jr., and custody of their two children.

The outcome of last week's sensational four-day divorce trial here was told last night by Superior Court Clerk Walter Wilson to whom Judge J. Mercer Johnson mailed the decision from Tucson.

Wilson said there was no mention of alimony or child-support payments in the decision. The father was granted "reasonable visitation" privileges.

Gloria had filed the divorce action but her husband countered with a cross complaint in which he charged infidelities and based much of his case on a gilt-edged diary kept by his wife while he was overseas.

The young heiress, crippled for life in an automobile accident with her husband late in 1946, had deeded from the witness stand having intimacies with any man other than her husband.

"Gone are the days of parties, carefree life and lighthearted days," her attorney, Frank Beer, told the court in its final session. "All this young mother wants now is her babies."

EUGENE, March 5 (AP)—The Willamette river's two floods this winter caused damage of \$7,550,000 in the area south of Albany, army engineers estimated today.

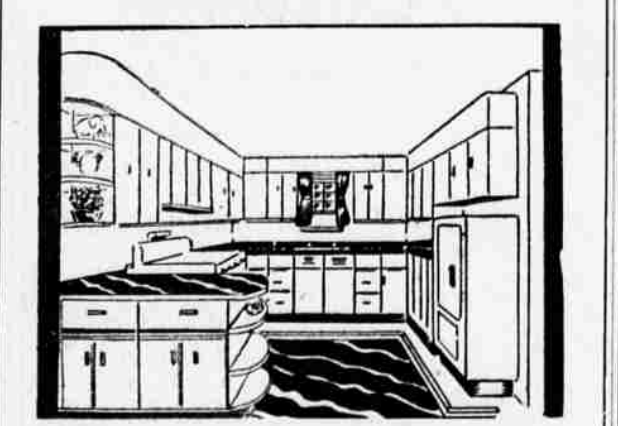
