Truman Named On Penny Primary HARRISBURG, Pa., March 6 (P)—President Harry S. Truman's name was entered today as a democratic candidate for president in the April 27 Pennsylvania primary—without his consent.

J. Warren Mickie, democratic state chairman, personally filed petitions from 86 of the commonwealth's 67 counties to place the president's name on the ballot in the presidential preference primary.

Lake County Library Eyed

LAKEVIEW, March 6—A resolution establishing a Lake county public library was adopted by the county court Thursday and a library board will be appointed shortly.

In the Thursday session the court had not decided which method of raising funds for the library they would adopt. They have two choices:

1. They can place the needed amount within their budget, then, if the budget exceeds the six per cent limitation, ask the taxpaying voters of the county to vote to exceed the limit.

2. An opinion of the attorney general may be sought before this one is adopted, if the court tends to favor this method; Call an election for a serial levy.

Under either method, the court said they will take action to have the special election to coincide with the primary election on May 21 rather than having a special election at a later date, bearing in mind the greater cost of a separate election date.

Proponents of a county library have been seeking such a unit for several years to replace the present library which is owned by the Lakeview Library association and financed by the city of Lakeview.

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Warner Road Work Talked

LAKEVIEW, March 6—An effort to insure acceptance of bids for improvement of the Warner Valley road here was made Thursday by the Lake county court when it agreed to inform the state highway commission that the county will put up to \$10,000 toward the bid price if bids are again too high for acceptance when they are opened in Portland March 12.

Bids on the road, including grading and surfacing on sections of a 21-mile stretch, were twice rejected last year for being too high. The court's action was made so that contracts may be let if coming bids are not too excessively high at this time.
