WESTERN OREGON—Scattered showers today followed by clearing toward evening. Fair and cooler tonight. Low 42 to 48. Increasing cloudiness Sunday with occasional rain beginning north portion in afternoon and spreading to south by evening. High both days 45 to 50. Van Vactor Is Rotary Speaker

D. E. Van Vactor, well known Klamath Falls attorney, Thursday expressed the opinion before the Klamath Rotary club that both the United Nations organization and the Marshall plan will have to be decidedly improved, and the improved plan of action applied immediately if further communist encroachment in Europe is to be stopped.

In a vigorous discussion of the vital need for greater national defense in America, Van Vactor stated: "I predict that within two years, if something drastic isn't done to make the UN and the Marshall plan work adequately and immediately, France will also join the ranks of communism."

Dave Totton, commanding officer of the new Klamath Falls national guard company, also spoke on defense and the need for a strong national guard.

George Hillis was Rotary's chairman of the day and introduced the speakers.

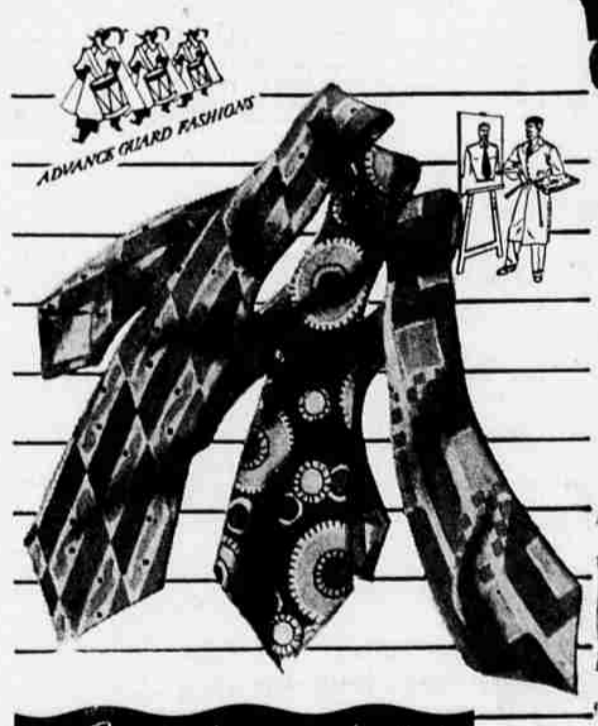
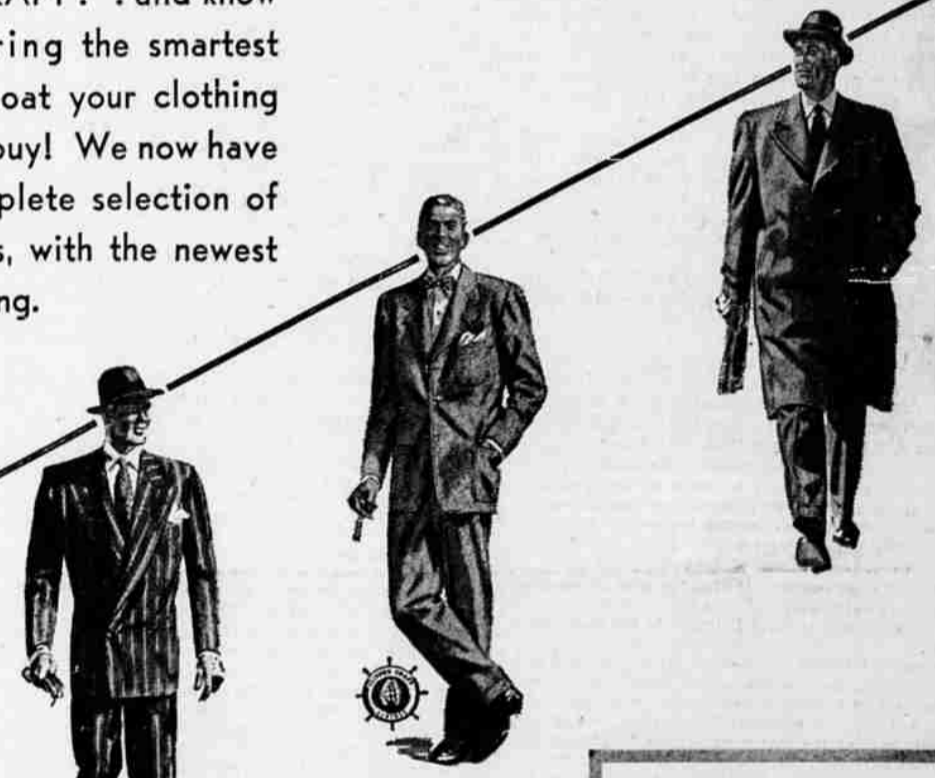
