# Cripps Predicts Collapse Of British Economy If No Substantial US Aid Given

LONDON, March 9 (AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps told parliament today British economy will collapse unless substantial U. S. aid comes this year.

The chancellor of the exchequer said in a white paper that only the Marshall plan can prevent wholesale unemployment, distress and dislocation of production. It said that, without the Marshall plan, there is "no prospect of a decent standard of living for years."

# Knife-Fork Club Hears Jeff Williams

Knife and Forkers appeared to have the time of their lives last night at the Willard hotel when Jeff Williams from Chickasha, Okla., entertained the membership for more than an hour and a half with story telling interspersed with Oklahoma-Texas wit which has earned for him the title, "The Soumer Philosopher."

Williams' title was "Getting Back to Fundamentals," and in this phase he urged individual courage and national courage in combating subversive influences which assail this country on every side. Williams had the Oklahoma touch, turning phrases with a kindly humor and yet injecting into his humorous talk good old-fashioned virtues which he expounded with philosophy.

The humorist urged a return to what he termed "collaboration," in other words the collaboration of mankind, each man with the other, and observed in his more serious moments that the "world was done for" unless the brotherhood of man was evidenced in every-day dealings. He drew on his wealth of experience as a speaker in all sections of the United States, to bring to his Klamath Falls Knife and Fork club listeners an evening of entertainment which appeared to delight the club immeasurably.

Williams was introduced by Elton Thompson and presiding over the dinner meeting was the Rev. F. C. Wissenbach, president of Knife and Fork.

# Huks Killed In Surprise Raids

MANILA, March 9 (AP)—Fifty-one Filipinos were killed in week-end violence after President Roxas outlawed the Kukulalaph (peasant) army and the National Peasant union.

Constabulary headquarters reported Monday 42 Huks were killed in a constabulary raid on a training camp maintained by the insurgents 30 miles north of Manila. Headquarters reported these other nine killings:

Two former members of the peasant union, killed by 120 armed men after the two had been questioned by constabulary.

Two constabulary soldiers, two Huks and three civilians, slain in a Huk attack on a government detachment.

The Huks were outlawed as a "subversive organization." Roxas linked them with Chinese communists and said they were intent on overthrowing the Philippines government.

# Morse Backs Tax Slash

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore.) came out today for reduction of federal income taxes.

"I am convinced that the great majority of my constituents in Oregon and the people of the country want some form of tax relief this year," Morse said in a statement.

He added he had told Chairman Milliken (R-Colo.) of the senate finance committee that any tax reduction program should include "some of the sound economic tax recommendations made to the committee on economic development by Paul G. Hoffman, president of the Studebaker corporation."

"These proposals cover amendments to the tax law I offered at the last session of congress and which I will offer again unless the Milliken report covers at least some of the major ones," Morse continued. He cited as some of the lowering of inheritance tax rates, broadening the tax base and adopting the community property principle on a nationwide basis for income tax purposes.

# Burglar Shot During Getaway

CHEWALAH, Wash., March 9 (AP)—A burglar leaving a drug store at 2 a. m. was shot and seriously wounded by a Chewalah businessman shooting from his apartment across an alley. Prosecutor Delbert Scoles said.

The wounded man was identified as Alva Munger. Scoles said he had admitted entering the building with a companion who escaped.

Harlan Deckert, restaurant owner, was awakened when he heard a window smashed. Scoles said. He called the police after seeing two men leaving the building, but fired at the pair with a .30 caliber rifle when police did not arrive immediately. Scoles said.

# Filbert Marketing Proposal Pushed

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Approval of a bill to extend the marketing agreements act to almonds and filberts was urged today by Senator Morse (R-Ore.).

Morse told the senate agriculture subcommittee that imports of Turkish and Italian filberts have kept the price of those nuts down, and that the industry is "in its lowest depression in history."

Morse described most growers as operating at a loss, and declared some are considering tearing up their gardens. Oregon produces 95 per cent of this country's filbert crop, he said.

# Snowfall Blocks Lake o' Woods Road

Travel into the Lake o' Woods area was discouraged by Caretaker Ed Morse who said Monday that a heavy storm was in progress and some eight inches had fallen by noon. Approximately three and one-half feet of snow covers the resort area at this time and the lake itself is covered with ice and snow and planes should not attempt to land unless equipped with skis.

Morse said there had been no winter damage to cabins and all those with three feet of snow on the roofs had been cleared.

# Principals, Supervisors Keep Posts

Principals of Klamath Falls schools and supervisors of the various educational phases were re-named last night at a meeting of both boards of education. Existing assignments will remain in force for the coming year, according to Superintendent Arnold I. Gralapp, who said that the teacher list will also be available at an early date.

Renamed were Stanley D. Woodruff, KHS; Gerald Clemens, Pelican; Lowell Kaup, Fremont and Junior high; Donald Golding, Riverside; Mrs. Florence Ollmann, Fairview; Augusta Parker, Conger; Darrell Potter, Roosevelt; Verne Speirs, Mills. All are principals.

On the supervisory side: Robert Banister, director of art education; Mrs. Lena Hackett, child guidance clinic and director of handicapped children's program; J. V. LaClair, director of audio-visual education; Mrs. Hazel Landry, cafeteria manager; Andrew Loney Jr., director of music education; Joseph Peak, director of physical education and health; Garry E. Robertson, general supervisor; Harold Teale, director of vocational education.

The elementary board discussed Conger school in relation to the physical plant and school population and ground improvements. Plans for the Mills school auditorium are developing. Gralapp said, and by this time next week it is possible that bids will be called on the structure. Money for the auditorium, some \$100,000, has already been made available.

It was announced that the high school found it necessary to add one additional bus line to serve the Almont district. The board also elected to expand the driver education program to include all boys and girls of driving age and to meet requirements, two cars instead of the one now in use, will be necessary.

Garry Robertson, teacher supervisor, outlined to the boards the social studies program from grades 1 to 12, inclusive. This embraces history, geography and government. Superintendent Gralapp told board members he was reporting to all teachers in the system at 3 p. m. today, Tuesday, on his recent attendance at the American Association of School Administrators held in Atlantic City, N. J.

Members of the family of Lawrence Senecal, former Klamath Bus company driver who was drowned in the Siuslaw river on January 31, 1948, have offered additional rewards for the finding of his body.

Mrs. Senecal has now offered another \$25, and a like amount is offered by Ed Niespo of Florence, Ore. A diver, Harold Maliken of Portland, worked last week in the river area but to no avail. Mr. Senecal moved with his family to Florence several years ago.

# Huge Shipbuilding Contracts Seen

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Rep. Jackson (D-Wash.) said today the west coast and Puget Sound shipbuilding yards will be given \$12,000,000 worth of ship repairs and reconversion.

He told a reporter that of \$140,000,000 worth of work being done only \$1,000,000 had previously been allocated to the west coast.

"The maritime commission told me today it will allocate most of the work remaining to be done to the west coast," Jackson said. "This will include conversion and repair of 25 C class ships which the commission will offer for sale. It will ask for bids for this work, costing about \$12,000,000 from west coast and Puget Sound ship yards."

# Reds Blast 3-Way Meet

MOSCOW, March 9 (AP)—The Soviet government said Monday the three-power London conference on Germany violated the Potsdam decisions and played into the hands of war instigators. Russia made public the text of a note to the British government.

The Russian note said the three-power London conference was a "violation of the Potsdam decisions" and a "violation of the agreement on the control council for Germany."

The Soviet note added:

"The policy of Great Britain, the United States and also France, led to undermining the agreement of the four powers on a control council for Germany and the Potsdam agreement on the council of foreign ministers."

The note said this British-American policy "played into the hands every sort of war instigators."

# Flaming Dress Kills Woman

SEATTLE, March 9 (AP)—A woman identified as Mrs. Edward P. Hayden, about 40, was burned to death here Monday when her clothing was ignited by an electric plate in a Fourth Avenue hotel room. Deputy Coroner Russell Linhart reported.

He said Mrs. Hayden was alone, her husband having left to buy a loaf of bread.

The fire department extinguished the fire in the room.

# Reds Release US Officials

NERNBERG, Germany, March 9 (AP)—Two high officials of the American war crimes prosecution staff returned to Nurnberg safely today after 27 hours in the custody of armed Russian soldiers within the Soviet-occupied zone of Germany.

The two are Howard H. Russell, of Baltimore, Md., chief of the administrative division, and Virgil Van Street of Katonahville, Md., member of the L. G. Farber prosecution staff.

They visited the Leipzig fair together with their wives in the past week. They were overdue in Nurnberg by several days, and inquiries were made.

The group returned late this afternoon, weary and nervous but unharmed.
