**NORTHERN CALIFORNIA**—Partly cloudy today and tonight. Fair Wednesday except increasing cloudiness Wednesday afternoon with showers in afternoon and night. Little change in temperature today. Slightly warmer Wednesday. Moderate to fresh northwesterly winds along northern coast today, decreasing to moderate westerly tonight along coast.

## Mac's Record In News High For Near Past

**WASHINGTON, March 9**—Gen. Douglas MacArthur figured in these recent political news events climaxed by an open bid for the republican presidential nomination: February 29—Endorsed clubs to organize Young Republican clubs on college campuses. He said the republican party "has never deviated from the proposition that all political power resides in the people."

March 2—The Hearst newspapers urged editorially that MacArthur be drafted.

March 3—MacArthur cabled the house foreign affairs committee he would not leave Japan at this time to testify on China aid because of "pressure of my operational duties." But he spoke out for a free China and said congress should not undercut Chinese needs or their importance.

March 3—Three former New England governors—Joseph B. Ely and James M. Curley, Mass., democrats, and Francis P. Murphy, New Hampshire, republican who supported Franklin D. Roosevelt—said they would support the general if he could be induced to run.

March 5—Warren Wright, Chicago banker, opened Washington headquarters for MacArthur campaign. He said MacArthur clubs would be formed in every state and county.

March 8—MacArthur said in Tokyo he would accept the presidency if called.
