

Police Probe Death Cause

SEATTLE, March 10 (AP)—Authorities, awaiting laboratory tests Tuesday to determine cause of the death of Mrs. Gene Dennis Von Herberg, 41, former stage psychic.

Mrs. Von Herberg, widow of J. G. Von Herberg, Seattle theatre operator, was found dead in her home yesterday. Coroner John P. Brill Jr., said death "apparently was from natural causes," but results of an autopsy were withheld pending laboratory analyses.

Friends said Mrs. Von Herberg had been grief-stricken since her husband's death last December 18, and had recently been in a hospital. Von Herberg and Miss Dennis, who won considerable stage attention as a psychic, were married in Paris in 1935. They had five children.

She was born in Atchison, Kansas.

Bemidji Goes To 32 Below

CHICAGO, March 10 (AP)—Bemidji, Minn., sometimes called the nation's ice box by weather forecasters, reported a deep freeze temperature early Tuesday—32 below zero.

The cold belt covered parts of the Dakotas, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa, with the zero line reaching as far south as Southern Wisconsin, Central Iowa and Lower South Dakota.

The mercury was below seasonal levels in sections of Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas.

Second coldest official temperature was 26 below at Grand Forks, N. D. Other low readings in North Dakota were —17 at Dickinson and —13 at Bismark.

In Minnesota, Duluth reported —10 and the Minneapolis minimum was —6. The mercury touched 5 above at Sioux City, Ia., and 8 above at St. Joseph, Mo.

Near normal temperatures were reported throughout other sections of the country. Yesterday's highest reading was 81—at Miami and Brownsville, Tex.

Mac Not On Oregon Ballot

PORTLAND, March 10 (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur's name will not appear on the Oregon republican primary ballot, the Oregon Journal said Tuesday.

Quoting Lansing Hoyt of Milwaukee, Wis., national chairman of the MacArthur-for-President club, the newspaper said that since the general's name is not now on petitions no effort will be made to capture the Oregon delegation for him.

Oregon law requires either that a candidate declare his candidacy or that 1,000 signatures advocating his candidacy be obtained.

The Journal said Hoyt reported by telephone that "due to a lack of time, no effort will be made in Oregon."

Friday is the last day for filing for the May 21 primary.

Drunk Driving Fine Given

Marie Elvira Fields, 29, of 734 Plum, pleaded guilty to a charge of drunk driving this morning in police court and was sentenced to 30 days in jail plus a \$100 fine. Police Judge Howard Strode said her operator's license would be suspended for a year.

The woman was arrested at Main and Eldorado late last night after her car allegedly struck a vehicle operated by A. M. Lepley, route 3, outside the city limits on highway 97 south.

Lepley followed her into town and reported the incident to police.

Clarence Staley, 49, of Klamath Falls, arrested February 28 on a charge of drunk driving, pleaded guilty yesterday and was fined \$100. His license also was ordered revoked.

GM Production Figure Gains

DETROIT, March 10 (AP)—General Motors produced 337,414 motor cars in the first two months of this year, the company announced Tuesday.

Included in the total were 130,308 cars and 38,138 trucks made in February.

The two months' total compares with 281,180 units manufactured in the like period last year and 481,661 assembled in January and February of 1941.

Doctors May Save GI's Arm

VIENNA, Austria, March 10 (AP)—U. S. army doctors reported Tuesday the shattered left arm of Pfc. Jack Grunden, who was shot by a Russian entry Sunday night, probably can be saved.

They reported a slight improvement in the condition of Grunden, whose home is in Portland, Ore.

U. S. army authorities said Grunden, walking with two other soldiers and three Austrian girls, was knocked down and shot in front of a Russian hotel headquarters. They said he had refused a Russian order to get off the sidewalk.

Grunden will be flown to Germany next week and probably will be sent to the United States later this month, said doctors at the 11th station hospital.
