

Northwest Communities Recommend Formation Of Highway 97 Association

Formation of a U. S. 97 Highway association was recommended by a group of 30 representatives of communities on the highway at a conference held in the Sherman county courthouse at Moro yesterday afternoon.

The over-all organization as proposed at the conference would represent all communities on the highway in California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. The organization would be divided into two units—the Washington and British Columbia group and the Oregon-California group.

Purpose of the U. S. 97 Highway association would be generally to work for the development of this highway and to promote travel upon it. Further details will be worked out by special committees, and another general meeting for consum-

mation of the organization project will probably be held in late April or May.

Attending the meeting from Klamath Falls were T. B. Watters, chairman of the roads and highways committee of the Klamath chamber of commerce; Malcolm Eppley, director in charge, and Manager Charles H. Stark of the chamber. Clarence Mutschenbacher, Dorris, accompanied the Klamath men as representative of California communities on No. 97.

Stark was named as a member of a steering committee which perfected organization plans at Moro and also is on the program of work committee.

Bend and Yakima will temporarily serve as headquarters for activities of the two divisions of the association.

Those present at the Moro meeting voted in favor of forming the association with the understanding that they would return to their home communities for confirmation of the program.

Former Basin Man Awarded CG Medal

Of interest here is word of the awarding of the Bronze Medal to Lt. Comdr. Charles Frederick Scharfenstein Jr., U. S. coast guard, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Scharfenstein of Long Beach, Calif., and former Klamath Falls residents.

The award was made for heroic service as commanding officer of LCI 87, of LCI flotilla 10 during the initial invasion on the coast of France, July 6, 1944.

Comdr. Scharfenstein, 33, who was graduated from the Coast Guard academy at New London, Conn., in 1942, was one of a few officers accepted for a postgraduate course in engineering at Annapolis naval academy where he now is in school. He and his wife and small son, Charles 3rd, 5, reside at Riva, Md., near Annapolis. His brother, Tommy, nine years younger, will be graduated from the Coast Guard academy in June.

The citation accompanying the Bronze Medal said in part that "under heavy enemy fire, Lt. Comdr. Scharfenstein, then lieutenant, took station close to the shore on the early morning of D-Day and throughout the bitterest part of the fighting efficiently assisted in the reorganization, grouping and dispatching of craft to the beach."
