Clocks Back On Schedule

Electric clocks in this area are back to normal after losing around six minutes each day on the 59 1/2 cycle current in force the past five weeks. The normal 60-cycle current is back and clock watchers won't have to keep one eye on the time-piece and an ear to the telephone, at least for the time being.

The California Oregon Power company, said Tuesday that clocks were now on schedule and if at any time Cope is forced back to the 59 1/2 cycle, the public will be so advised.

It was rumored here today that Pacific Gas and Electric company has made a deal with Edison Electric company to the south for the delivery of 100,000 kilowatts from that system. This has made it possible to return to normal speed on their generators and enables a return to the 60-cycle current in this area. Cope buys power from PG&E through its transmission lines to the south.

read by Jack Marshall of Poe Valley. Luncheon was served at noon with entertainment furnished by the Henley high school band.

Paul Rodgers, representing the Tulelake chamber of commerce, welcomed visitors in the afternoon. Lee McMullen, secretary-treasurer of the Klamath Production Credit association, told of the history and future of the co-op.
