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No Seal, So Trip Okay

DETROIT, Mich., March 11 (AP)—Larry Hightower was free to continue his wheelbarrow jaunt around the world today. He convinced Detroit police he doesn't have Washington's missing state seal.

Hightower, who began his wheelbarrow travelogue in Ellensburg, Wash. last year, was stopped by Detroit police yesterday.

But the background to the incident was developed in Olympia, Wash.

There, it was learned, the Talcott brothers who designed the original seal had urged Earl S. Coe, the secretary of state, to make an effort to find the missing emblem.

Shortly afterward, Coe said, he received a call from Hightower who frequently reports his progress. During the conversation, Coe asked:

"Say, Larry, you don't happen to have the state seal?"

"Yes," came the response. "I've got it right here in my wheelbarrow."

Hightower's seal, however, was stamped on a gold-fringed flag of Washington presented by Governor

Wallgren when he started the tour. The state's original seal, it developed, has been missing more than a quarter century.
