

Marshall To Fight China Military Aid

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall stood firm today in the face of insistent demands from some of his wartime subordinates that the United States throw big scale military aid into the fight against communism in China.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer and Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault all have declared in the past week that this country must go beyond economic help for Chiang Kai-shek's hard-pressed nationalist government.

But Marshall—army chief of staff during the war—made clear yesterday that the three-year-old American policy toward China still stands.

Two Courses

His news conference response to questions thus put it officially on the record that the United States is following two different courses in meeting the communist challenge in Europe and in the Far East.

The difference is, however, washed out to some extent by the fact that in both China and Europe the United States is actively aiding governments fighting the communists.

As for China, Marshall said he still believes its government should be broadened to provide greater representation. Asked whether that should include the communists, he said yes.

But Marshall hastened to add a qualification. He said the trouble now is that the communist party is engaged in open rebellion against the Chinese government. And how that problem is to be handled is for the Chinese government to decide and not for the United States to dictate.

Umatilla Bank Charter Okayed

SALEM, March 11 (AP)—A charter has been issued by the state superintendent of banks for a proposed Inland Empire bank at Umatilla which expects to open for business March 24.

The new bank will be a member of the federal reserve system and will have paid in capital funds of \$35,000. Superintendent A. R. Rogers reported.

He listed directors as Ursel Hiatt and H. B. Hull, of Umatilla, and Roger Bounds, F. B. Swayze and F. M. Swayze of Hermiston. Bounds was named as manager of the bank by F. B. Swayze, president of the First National bank of Hermiston.

Blast Rips Jew Building

JERUSALEM, March 11 (AP)—The closely guarded Jewish Agency building was badly damaged by an explosion today soon after a car flying an American flag was seen entering its courtyard.

The Jewish Agency announced eight persons were killed and 89 were injured. None of the casualties was a top officer of the agency, the official spokesman for Palestine Jewry, though three of those slightly hurt were minor officials.

Jews in the building at the time said the automobile with the American flag entered the courtyard through the guarded gate with two men inside. The men parked the car, walked out past the guard and drove away in a waiting taxicab, the witnesses said. The building caught fire after the blast.

The gate guards said that because the car showed the American flag and the occupants "seemed English or American types," they let it in without a careful check.

A source in Haganah, the Jewish Agency's militia, said examination of wreckage indicated the automobile was that of United States Consul General Robert B. MacAtee, stolen yesterday.

The semi-circular two-story stone-

Three Named In Narcotics Case

EVERETT, March 11 (AP)—A federal grand jury indicted Garfield C. Barnett, Everett attorney, and two other persons Wednesday, charging them with violations of the narcotics act.

The indictment returned to U. S. District Judge Lloyd L. Black named Barnett, Ralph R. Macartney Jr., Everett, and Leonard A. Douglas, Snohomish.

The indictment said that on February 7, in Everett, the three conspired in the sale of more than one dozen bottles containing narcotics. It charged that on January 17 Barnett drove from Everett to Snohomish and received the narcotics from Douglas at the latter's home.

Barnett was accused in the indictment of selling some of the drugs later to narcotics agents.

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Herald-News Starts New Baby Feature

How many people would be interested to look back to the news of the world on the day they were born?

The Herald and News is now extending a new courtesy in the form of a five-by-seven inch photograph of the front page of the newspaper, sent to each baby born in Klamath Falls. At the top of the photo are the words, "This was the news of the world on the day you were born." At the bottom are the words, "Compliments of The Herald and News, Klamath Falls, Ore. For your baby book."

First of these courtesy photographs were mailed out on Friday, February 13, 1948, to babies born on that date. Remodeling in the photograph department at the H & N, delayed continuing the practice immediately. Now facilities for printing are set up again and babies born in Klamath Falls after February 13, will each receive one of the courtesy cards.

Because The Herald and News does not publish on Sunday, babies born on the seventh day of the week will receive a card for the Monday following.

Gen. Meyers Rests Case

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers rested his case today without calling a single witness in defense of a charge that he induced a business associate to lie to a senate committee.

Attorneys for the retired air force officer laid the groundwork, however, for a plea for the general's outright acquittal. This plea to the court was to be based on a contention that the senate group which inquired into Meyers' business affairs last fall was illegal.

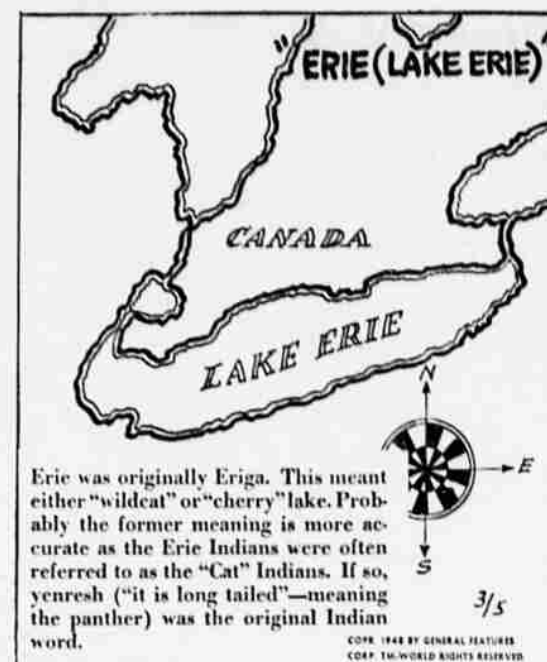
The only evidence placed before the federal jury in defense of Meyers was a series of senate resolutions creating the senate war investigating committee.
