

Angus Show Slated Here April 18-19

The first annual registered and commercial Aberdeen Angus show and sale at Klamath Falls, April 18 and 19, will have Ed R. Blaginski as official judge. Blaginski is the owner of the San Jeronimo ranch, Cayuse, San Luis Obispo county, Calif., one of the leading Angus breeding and commercial establishments in the West.

At the Klamath Falls Angus sale, held at the fairgrounds, Blaginski will have the responsibility of judging the 60 head of registered females and bulls, as well as 50 head of commercial steers. The commercial stock will be sold in pens of five.

The show is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, April 18, at the Klamath county fairgrounds. Only sale stock will be shown. Contributors to the Klamath Falls sale and show are members of the Pacific Coast Aberdeen Angus association, sponsor of the sale.

Blaginski is one of the oldest breeders of Angus cattle in the state of California. Many Angus herds in the West have been furnished with original foundation stock from the San Jeronimo ranch. Scores of Future Farmers and 4-H clubbers have gotten their start with his stock.

Blaginski is vice president of the Pacific Coast Aberdeen Angus association.

All AAA members should study this handbook, listing the practices that they intend to carry out this year, the acreage of crops and the number of livestock that they expect to have this year.

Pullets Lead Egg Laying

Twenty-five to 30 per cent more eggs are laid by pullets than two-year-old hens, says Noel Bennion, extension poultryman from Oregon State college. Bennion spoke at a general poultry meeting at the Shasta View school the evening of March 2.

Replacing 70 to 100 per cent of the old hens each year with pullets will guarantee a high level of egg production, according to Bennion. Older hens usually go into a two to three month molt, during which time they lay but a few, if any, eggs. By replacing these old hens with pullets, this lapse in production can be eliminated.

Bennion discussed other phases of poultry management and showed some slides. He stated that the prevention of most poultry disease was largely a matter of good management.

Price Schroeder, state department of agriculture representative, also spoke briefly on poultry and turkey improvement work.

Ultra-Violet Lamp Used In Seed Spud Quality Test

An additional method of determining seed quality of potatoes was demonstrated in Klamath county last week. John McLain, manager of Kern County Seed Potato association, spent several days here working with the county agent's office.

McLain has been experimenting with an ultra violet lamp and has found that potatoes infected with leaf roll when cut and placed under the lamp show a distinct type of fluorescence. The cut surfaces of healthy potatoes appear a uniform lavender color while the cut surfaces of leaf roll infected potatoes show blotches of metallic light blue color.

Potatoes which show the light blue blotches under the lamp when planted are said invariably to grow up showing typical leaf roll symptoms. The metallic light blue blotches of color bloom out all over the cut surfaces of potatoes affected with net necrosis.

Work with the ultra violet lamp here last week indicates that this method of inspecting potatoes for presence of leaf roll infection is quite reliable.

In general the lamp method found a high percentage of flour-
