### Power Survey Asked Here

The power situation in the Klamath area may be included in an economic survey now under way by Hahn, Campbell and associates of Burlingame, Calif., following a request made by Klamath County chamber of commerce directors Wednesday following a report from the chamber's executive committee.

This phase of the survey is requested due to concern felt over the power situation and recently the chamber had its attention directed in the matter by various Klamath firms and individuals. The matter of daylight savings also enters into the picture, directors observed.

The directors passed a motion at noon urging President Truman to sign a bill which would transfer Shasta lake from the park service to the forest service. The chamber had previously urged passage of the bill which has been approved by both houses and is now in the president's hands. Directors believe there would be a more liberal policy in respect to recreational usage of the area, if control would be controlled by the forest service.

The chamber reiterated opposition to valley authorities, such as the Columbia valley authority, as proposed in legislation now pending in congress.

### Soviets Free Austrian Girl

VIENNA, March 11 (AP)—A 19-year-old Austrian girl, her face still swollen from the blow of a Russian gun butt, said Wednesday she underwent grueling questioning by the Russians after her American companion was shot in the back by a Soviet sentry.

Red-haired Efriede Elias said she was seized by the Russians while trying to give first aid to Pfc. Jack Grunden, 18, of Portland, Ore., the unarmed American who was beaten and shot in a scuffle with Russian soldiers Sunday night.

She said she was taken through a back door of the Russian-occupied Grand hotel and driven to Russian headquarters. There, she said, she was questioned three times by Russian officers before being released Monday night.

Miss Elias said she had signed a statement dictated by the Russians and was warned:

"If you tell another story to the Americans later on, we will find you, wherever you are, and then you will see what happens to you."

### Czech Coup Probe Asked

LAKE SUCCESS, March 11 (AP)—Dr. Jan Papanek, Czechoslovak delegate to the United Nations, demanded Wednesday that the UN security council investigate the communist coup in Czechoslovakia.

Dr. Papanek told a hurriedly called news conference at UN headquarters that he had submitted to Trygve Lie, UN secretary general, a formal demand that the security council consider the February 20 change in the Czechoslovak government.

Dr. Papanek was a friend of Jan Masaryk, who fell to his death in Prague today.

Of himself, Papanek said in an emphatic voice:

"I represented the Czechoslovak government that existed before February 20. I was never a representative of the new regime. I am not resigning my office (as Czechoslovak delegate to the United Nations)."

### Gagsters Start Political Quip Drive On 'Mac'

TOKYO, March 11 (AP)—General MacArthur may as well get used to it. The political gags have started.

"As Hokkaido goes so goes the nation," quipped one American, who promised to "get out the vote" on that northern island, a sort of Maine of Japan.

"What will MacArthur do about the deep South?" another line goes. "Will there be civil liberties for Kyushuans?" (Kyushu is the south home island.)

A favorite pastime among Americans, both civilian and uniformed, is selecting a cabinet. You'd be surprised how often Emperor Hirohito's name crops up.

There also is one campaign slogan afloat which carries a note of validity. It was coined by an American in the occupation forces who has been in Japan a long time. It is: "Let's go back with Mac."

thought, had been bought and paid for by throwing Czechoslovakia to the Hitler wolves.

AS it turned out, that wasn't true. Instead of being appeased, Hitler's appetite was merely whetted. He thought he had Britain and France on the run. WAR FOLLOVED in a matter of weeks.

Still, you can understand the feeling of the Czechs. They had been thrown to the ravens by their friends. In their angry disillusionment, they TURNED TO RUSSIA.

Russia, too, BETRAYED THEM. The final chapter of the story of their DOUBLE betrayal has just been told.

IMAGINE Masaryk, sitting in his office, with the liberty of his people lying in ruin outside his window. By turning to Russia—partly in anger over a previous betrayal, partly in hope of saving something from the wreck—he had sold his own liberty-loving nation into the slavery that had finally and irrevocably arrived.

His thoughts must have been bitter, indeed. In that hour of agony, self-destruction might easily have seemed the only answer.

AT any rate, there is the story of APPEASEMENT and what it brings.

If we appease Russia long enough and cravenly enough, it will bring us to where Czechoslovakia now lies.

**Atomic Board Aids Schools**

RICHLAND, Wash., March 11 (AP)—The atomic energy commission will give prompt financial and transportation help to overcrowded schools in six communities of the Hanford works area, commission officials said today.

Agreements have been signed with school boards in Pasco, Kennewick, Benton City, Prosser, Grandview and Sunnyside, officials said. Each community will get from \$15,000 to possibly \$180,000 a year, depending upon the number of students whose parents are employed at the Hanford project.

The commission also will loan from one to nine buses to each town to help transport school children.

The assistance rate to schools will be \$240 a year per pupil, officials said, and payment will be retroactive to the beginning of the current year.

**Street Paving Study Slated**

Residents of Upham street are another step closer to getting their street paved today. A committee of councilmen and other city officials appointed to study the impalprovement project today okayed taking \$3718.25 from the street fund to make up the city's share of the expense.

Next step will be official council action on the recommendation next Monday night. Property owners have agreed to pay their share of the cost, and the county has indicated that it is willing to pay expenses on property it owns in the area. With the city's agreement to pay its share for paving in front of the eight lots it owns, the way will be clear to pave Upham.

**Snow Flurries Seen For Klamath**

The mercury stayed a little higher this morning than in the past several mornings and temperature readings reported a minimum of 22 today, with yesterday's maximum 43. The forecast for the next 24 hours is "cloudy with snow flurries."

Mountain roads were in good condition today with most of the heavy packed snow gone, the state highway commission reported. At Odell lake the minimum was 24 degrees, skies were cloudy, 93 inches of roadside snow with spots of packed snow well sanded. Roads were normal over Sun mountain on highway 97, and Hayden mountain of the Greensprings highway.

**Beauty Aids To Be Sold In Groceries**

NEW YORK, March 11 (AP)—The manufacturer of a new line of beauty aids has decided to sell them exclusively through grocery stores.

The Allied Home Products corporation of Beloit, Wis., in an announcement today said it was the first such nationwide arrangement in the history of the cosmetics trade. The company is entering the beauty aids field for the first time after 16 years of production of cleaners, waxes and similar products.

Nathan C. Levine, president, said grocery stores were chosen as the outlet for the cosmetics line because they have the greatest daily consumer traffic.

**Sawmill Worker Injured In Fall**

Henry H. Sweetman, employe of Klamath Basin Pine Mills, was injured about the head at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday when he fell against a piece of mill machinery.

Sweetman, who lives at 749 N. 9th, was moved from the mill to Hillside hospital by Professional Ambulance service. He suffered a bad cut above the eye.

### Austria May Get Strikes

VIENNA, March 11 (AP)—Informed government sources said today that a wave of communist-inspired strikes is expected throughout Austria next week.

Informants said the communists are expected to bring about work stoppages through groups similar to the "action committees" of Czechoslovakia.

(In Czechoslovakia action committees were set up before and after the communists gained control of the government. They are composed of strong party members. They have been given the job of purging national life of opposition to the communists.)

Minister of Interior Oskar Helmer already has publicly warned the communists that such groups are illegal and may be punished under Austrian law in certain circumstances.

The executive committee of the Austrian Trade Union federation has told its members that anyone helping to establish such action committees will be expelled from the federation.

In rejecting a communist demand for a general 25 per cent wage increase, the committee instructed Austrian workers to strike only on orders from the trade union federation.

### Thad Wilson Death Told

Capt. Thad S. Wilson, 47, of the California highway patrol at Alturas, died suddenly at Modoc County hospital at 11:05 a. m. today. Word was radioed from Alturas to Officer Gerald Wilson of the state patrol at Tulelake.

Death was attributed to a cerebral hemorrhage. Capt. Wilson was stricken at 1:15 p. m. Wednesday, and never regained consciousness.

Capt. Wilson was recently promoted to inspector at Marysville, Calif., and was to have taken the post March 15. He came to Alturas in April, 1946.

He is survived by his wife, Helen, and a son, Bud, both of Alturas, a daughter, Jane, a student at Oregon State college in Corvallis, and a sister, who resides in Los Angeles, Calif. No funeral arrangements have been made.

### Hungry Horse Site Gets BPA Power

PORTLAND, Ore., March 11 (AP)—Power for construction of Hungry Horse dam in Northwestern Montana began flowing today, Bonneville power administration reported here.

Bonneville's 59-mile line from Kerr dam on Flathead lake, Montana, to the Hungry Horse site was completed last night. The line will supply power for the bureau of reclamation in constructing the Hungry Horse dam, and—after the dam is finished—will transmit its power into the Lower Flathead valley.

The project is part of the Columbia basin dam network.
