## Civilization, Religion Is Talk Topic

"Can Civilization Do Without Religion?" is the title of the sermon to be preached at the Congregational church, Garden near Martin, Sunday morning by Rev. Godfrey Matthews. ## New Sunday School Course To Be Outlined Sunday

Alice McGuire, representative of the Presbyterian board of Christian education in Philadelphia, will present the "New Curriculum" for Sunday school classes to the Peace Memorial and First Presbyterian churches at a meeting at the First Presbyterian church Friday, March 19, at 7:30 p. m.

Film strips and a sound movie will be used to explain the new course of study entitled "Christian Faith and Life: a Program for Church and Home," and the books to be used when the course starts in October will be on display.

Miss McGuire will explain the way this new curriculum of a series of graded books for the children, and correlated magazines for their parents, plus the workbooks for the teacher, can be used to bring the church and home closer together in the religious education of the child.

The course of study begins with the cradle roll and continues through high school, adding up to a library of some 30 books giving a comprehensive view of biblical history as the child progresses from grade to grade. The new curriculum has been in preparation since 1938, and features a new emphasis on realism and authenticity in the biblical illustrations included in the books.

The meeting is designed especially for teachers and parents, but anyone interested is cordially invited to attend.

Miss McGuire will meet with the Lakeview Presbyterians on March 17. A meeting at Merrill March 18 will include the churches of Tulelake, Mt. Laki and Malin. Miss McGuire, who graduated from the San Francisco Theological seminary at San Anselmo, is touring the western states presenting this material.
