Juveniles—Juveniles of Neighbors of Woodcraft will meet in the KC hall, Monday, March 15 at 4 p. m.

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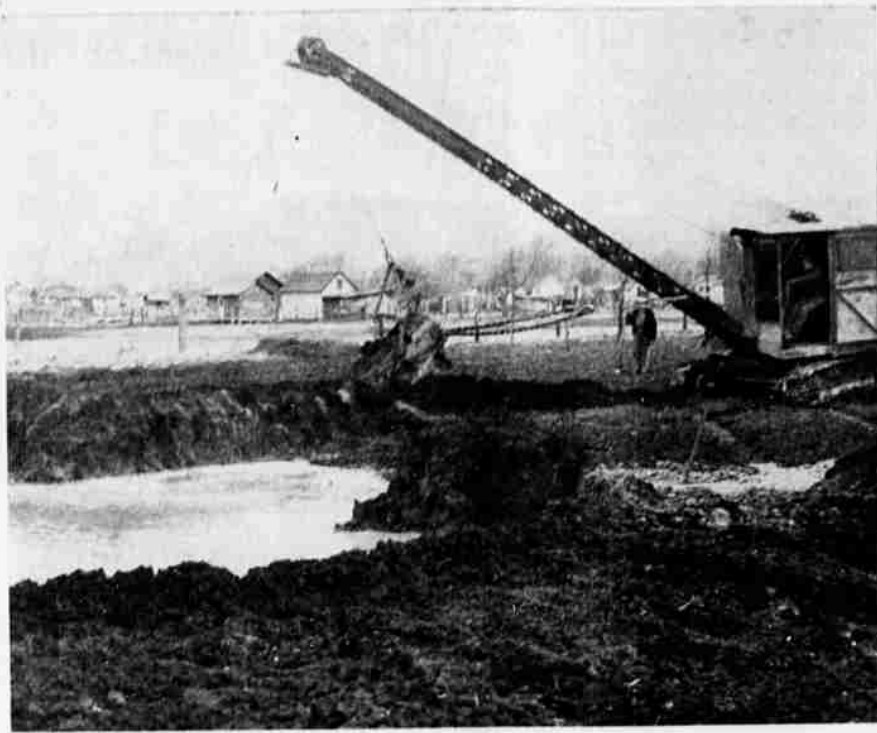
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Ward Swimming Pool Excavated

Payrolls In State Show Good Gains

SALEM, March 12 (AP)—Payrolls of firms covered by the state industrial accident commission have increased 15 per cent in the past year, the commission said today.

February payrolls totaled \$48,700,000, a loss of \$3,200,000 from January, but a gain of \$6,400,000 over February, 1947.

For firms in Multnomah county, the combined payrolls in February was \$18,200,000, a loss of \$1,700,000 from January, but a \$900,000 gain over February, 1947.
