

Soroptimists Hear Special Speaker

Florence Beardsley, state superintendent of elementary education, was guest speaker at the Thursday noon luncheon meeting of the Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls.

Miss Beardsley, who is a member of the Salem Soroptimist club, chose as her subject, "Not For Ourselves Alone." She stated that "We are already fighting the third World War, and in this stage it is still a war of idealism. We are too apt to think of ourselves alone and not of what others think of us. We must look to ourselves in what we think will have on the peoples of the world. We must know how other people in other countries feel and think so that we will have a better understanding of how to live peacefully with them."

Miss Beardsley stated further that Americans, as a nation, must determine what they believe and for what they stand and not just talk about it but follow through, because that's what the other nations are watching—to see if they intend to carry out their convictions.

In closing, she said that "we must achieve understanding for ourselves and see that our children understand by educating them to have hope of liberty and justice in a land where we can live free of fear."

All members present enthusiastically agree that Miss Beardsley's talk was timely and inspirational.
