## Today's Roundup

**THAT** picture in Saturday's paper of an early-day Central Oregon wagon freight outfit packed a terrific impression on David Mosby of San Francisco, who happened to be in Klamath Falls Saturday to attend the funeral of a relative.

Mr. Mosby picked up the evening paper, took a look at the back page, and there was the freight string which he, as a boy of 12, was permitted to drive one day in the Silver Lake country 40 or 50 years ago.

Mr. Mosby, now a teacher in the Lincoln high school in San Francisco, has vivid recollections of the experience — recollections of the kind people have of an incident that was a highlight of childhood. "I drove that team," he told me on the telephone Saturday night. "I was a youngster at Silver Lake at the time, and I went along one day when Ed Henderson, the driver, took the outfit to a flat back of Hager mountain near Silver Lake to load some wool. He wanted a pay-load for the trip back to Shaniko.

"If you look closely at the picture, you will see that the left wheel horse is gray. His name was Dick We used him to pull the wool up on the wagons. The other wheel horse—you will notice the wheel animals are horses and the others mules—was named Jerry. "On the way back into Silver Lake, Ed let me drive the team, and he lay down back in the wool and snoozed in the warm sunshine. It wasn't much of a trick driving them. They knew the way, and all I had to do was sit on the gray and think I was important. "One of the mules was named Gyp, another Jack, and the left lead mule was Becky. I did a lot of hollering at those mules, pretending that it meant something. Boy, was that a big thing for me, driving that freight outfit that day.

"Ed Henderson did all the driving of the outfit on the long Silver Lake-Shaniko runs. The outfit was owned by J. C. Conn who had a store in Silver Lake. "Ed always kept his black dog, Nig, in the trail wagon. Nig rode there most of the time, but sometimes he would want off the wagon. Invariably when that happened, he would come back with his nose full of porcupine quills.

"Ed would stop everything and for 20 or 25 minutes work on Nig's nose with a pair of pliers. It took a lot of time to drive that outfit from Shaniko to Silver Lake, and the loss of 20 minutes now and then to relieve Nig's plight didn't make much difference."

## The Doctor Says—

### Infections Effect Sciatica

Sciatica is a term used to describe pain along the course of the sciatic nerve, which runs down the back of the leg from the buttocks to the heel. Sciatica is not really a disease of itself, because many different things can irritate the nerve and cause pain.

It is claimed by some doctors that most cases of "sciatic neuritis" are caused by a hernia or rupture of a cartilage-like substance which lies between the vertebrae of the spinal column. Certainly many cases of pain in the sciatic nerve have been relieved by the surgical treatment of this rupture.

Pain in the sciatic nerve also may come from conditions elsewhere in the body. Such diseases as diabetes, certain kinds of vitamin deficiencies and rheumatic conditions produce sciatic pain. Infection in an abscessed tooth or diseased tonsils also cause sciatic. In such cases, removal or drainage of the infected areas may bring relief. This does not always happen, however, and many disappointments have occurred.

When the sciatic nerve is subjected to pressure from something in or near the spine itself, sciatic pain may result. Any disorder of the lower back, for example, can be relieved by sciatic.

#### PHYSICAL THERAPY USED

When no cause can be found, other measures of treatment have to be tried. Sometimes the injection of a local anesthetic or salt solution

relieves the pain. Manipulation, together with other measures of physical therapy, such as heat or diathermy, may be helpful. X-ray treatments and special exercises have been used successfully in some of the more difficult cases.

Whatever the cause, sciatica is likely to be extremely painful. Until more is learned about the cause of the more obscure types, it will be difficult to treat all cases.

#### THE DOCTOR ANSWERS

**QUESTION:** What is the cause of a steady, severe thumping pain on the left side of the head?

**ANSWER:** A symptom such as this calls for examination, as it could reflect some serious condition in the head, ear, or body as a whole.

And that we are now legislating to add to that at least \$5,300,000,000, not counting what goes to China, Greece, Turkey, Japan and Germany.

Further, the professor says: ".... Here again, between the lines of Mr. Byrnes' unemotional prose, the red monster is reaching out menacingly to gobble up all of God's children, and all good men and true must rally to halt its fiendish onrush and save Christianity, capitalism and civilization from annihilation."

## The Gallup Poll Dewey On Top In GOP Ranks For Prexy

**PRINCETON, N. J.**—March 13—Governor Thomas E. Dewey's victory in New Hampshire and General Douglas MacArthur's statement of availability last week moved the race for the republican nomination into high gear.

As the campaign starts in earnest, the latest Institute popularity test conducted among republican voters throughout the country reveals the following current trends:

1. With only four months to go until convention time, Governor Dewey's popularity has risen to 37 per cent, while MacArthur's has fallen to 15 per cent. The following table gives the poll results:

Eamon de Valera undoubtedly was voicing the burning hope of his people when he predicted in New York the other day that Eire and Northern Ireland ultimately would be united into one nation.

His prediction also was pleasing to the host of Irish Americans who welcomed him back to the city of his birth. The Fighting Irishman, who lost the prime ministership of Eire as the result of the recent general election, after holding that position 16 years, declared the day will arrive when an Irish leader will come to the United States and announce that Ireland "from sea to sea is now completely free."

"I admit," he added, "that I would like to be that person."

I've known Mr. De Valera a long time, and have so much respect for his acumen that I certainly wouldn't challenge his forecast. However, I note that he didn't place any time limit on the prediction and is rather in the position of the Scotoman who was charged with breach of promise. The judge asked him:

De Valera doesn't say how soon he expects the union of Eire and Northern Ireland to take place. Of course time heals a lot of wounds, but, having studied that situation at

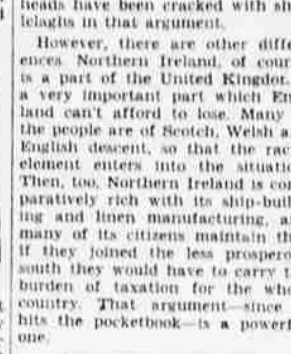
