March 16, 1925—United States Senator Robert N. Stanfield will introduce a bill for a federal building in Klamath Falls, according to a letter received today by Linn W. Nesmith of the building committee.

March 17, 1925—Menace to the water supply of Rocky Point and summer cottages along Pelican Bay was eliminated yesterday when Jack Ryan, working under contract for D. M. McLemore, hauled out fifteen carcasses of dead cattle from the waters of Pelican Bay and creeks nearby.

March 18, 1925—Yreka—Trapping his quarry after a chase from Weed to Tia Juana, back again to Chilcoquin and thence to Ashland by means of the man's remarkably small and well regulated teeth, Sheriff A. S. Calkins of Siskiyou county rushed Bert Hill into jail charged with murder.

March 19, 1925—Appointment of David R. Vandenberg, Portland attorney, as deputy district attorney for Klamath county, was announced this morning by Acting District Attorney W. P. Myers.

Samuel Smith Killed By Car Near Corvallis

Samuel W. D. Smith, 30-year-old Murphy, Ore., resident and father of Roderick M. Smith of Klamath Falls and Gordon Smith of Lakeview, was killed instantly last night when he was struck by a car driven by Reuben Migneault, Corvallis, as Smith was crossing highway 99 just north of Corvallis.

Benton County Sheriff C. N. Lilly said Mr. Smith was walking on the pavement on the right hand side of the highway and that Migneault, who did not see the aged man until the car hit him, Mr. Smith was en route from Grants Pass to Carleton, driving a light truck in which he was transporting household goods belonging to a neighbor, Mrs. Laura Downing, who was moving to Carleton. He had stopped near Corvallis to get his truck lights repaired. Mr. Downing was walking with Smith but was not hurt. Sheriff Lilly said Migneault was not held.

Mr. Smith was well known here and had made his home in Klamath Falls from 1916 to 1923, when he operated a notion store on Main street across from the Evans building. He and Mrs. Smith, who died December 31, 1943, had moved to a

office in the Underwood building, 24 years ago. Mr. Smith was born in May, 1867, in New York state.

Mr. Smith was an ardent hunter and each year during the deer season joined his sons and a group of others for an annual trek into the mountains. Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Smith, 931 Prospect, visited with the elderly man just last Sunday at Medford. Roderick Smith left early this morning for Corvallis to make final arrangements. In addition to his two sons, Mr. Smith is survived by a daughter, Mrs. E. T. Saunders, Portland.


