Whittington was identified by Police Chief Wilbur Perkerson who said his prisoner walked into the police station with the money after a taxi driver had said it was a restaurant.

The police chief quoted Whittington as saying he placed planks in the chute of the depository vault at the First National bank and later returned to lift out the bundles which had stopped the shaft.

### Loyalty File Closed Down

WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—President Truman Monday ordered federal agencies to turn down any requests from congress or the courts for secret papers on loyalty investigations of government employees.

He instructed agency chiefs to refer any demand, including any subpoena to the office of the president for such response as the president may determine to be in the public interest in the particular case.

The order in effect backed up Secretary of Commerce Harriman who has refused to give a house committee papers dealing with the department's investigation of Dr. Edward U. Condon's loyalty.

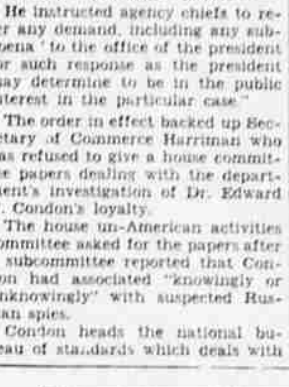
The house un-American activities committee asked for the papers after a subcommittee reported that Condon had associated "knowingly or unknowingly" with suspected Russian spies.

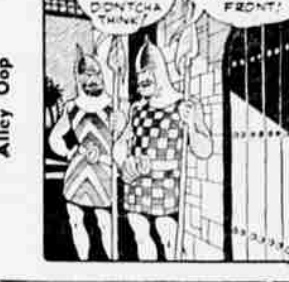
