

Solons Ask Facts In Coal Tie-Up

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The congressional "watchdog committee" on labor relations called today for "all facts" from John L. Lewis and soft coal operators on the mine shutdown.

Senator Ball (R-Minn.), chairman of the senate-house committee, disclosed he has sent similar telegrams to Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, and Ezra Van Horn, representing the mine operators.

Ball said he made the request yesterday and asked for replies within 48 hours.

More than 338,000 of the 400,000 soft coal diggers are idle in a dispute over use of the miners' welfare fund to set up a miners pension plan.

The administration has been seeking a way to halt the walkouts.

Ball's committee was established to keep check on operations of the Taft-Hartley law. Ball said the group had been instructed specifically to report to congress on "the general subject of welfare funds."

All the facts are needed, Ball said, "since the committee must consider what further steps it should take in the matter."

There was no immediate comment from Lewis or Van Horn.

Woman Dies In Leap From Car

TACOMA, March 17 (AP)—A 24-year-old Tacoma mother of three small youngsters leaped to her death from a moving automobile here early today, Pierce County Coroner Paul Mellinger said.

The woman, Mrs. Ellen Dietman, a nurse, was riding with four other persons at about 1 a. m. near the Tilton beach lagoon. Her companions, Mellinger said, reported that they had been arguing with Mrs. Dietman when she opened the door of the automobile, which was traveling at about 30 miles an hour, and jumped out. She died three hours after being taken to the hospital.

Mellinger listed the death as accidental. Police do not know where Mrs. Dietman's husband is. The Dietmans have been separated about a year.

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The senate killed Tuesday, 58 to 25, President Truman's proposal to place federal job services in the labor department.

The vote disapproved a reorganization plan Mr. Truman had sent to congress. The house already had turned it down.

The teen-agers' scrap drive, sponsored by the Klamath Union high school K club, continued today, as trucks toured the city to pick up contributions.

Scrap metal and clothing are wanted. Sessler brothers have donated trucks and men to assist the teen-age group, and will buy the scrap.

Money from the scrap drive will be used to finance remodeling of the R. P. Oliver building at 228 N. 5th, which Mr. and Mrs. Oliver donated for the center's use. Remodeling should not exceed about \$2000, Procter said, and consists mainly of adding a fire escape, rearrangement of doors, addition of lavatories, and other minor changes.

Proceeds left after the remodeling job will be used for the center's program, which Procter and the teen-age adult council hope to make free to the community's teen-agers.

Measles Season With Us Again

PORTLAND, March 17 (AP)—The state board of health warned today that the measles season was back. The board said it was distributing immune serum globulin to county health departments.

The globulin makes measles attacks less severe. So far this year the prevalence of measles has been lower than average in Oregon.

Not a single new case of diphtheria, meningitis, poliomyelitis, or typhoid fever was reported in Oregon last week. Influenza, though, still struck 181 persons during the week, continued to decline in frequency.
