

Huskies Get 50-50 Chance

KANSAS CITY, March 18 (AP)—The University of Washington Huskies, Pacific coast champions, found themselves a 50-50 choice today to end up in the finals of the Western NCAA basketball championships.

Odds-makers along the line pick Washington to take Baylor when the two clubs tangle tomorrow night after Kansas State and Wyoming open the Mid-West show. The Kansans are favored to dump Wyoming and then to edge out the Huskies for the Western title.

Possibly figuring in the selections is Baylor's early season 66-57 loss to California. Washington won four of its five games in the southern division coast conference titles.

Both squads, however, play a hard-driving, running type of ball.

Hit The Beds
Washington arrived here early yesterday morning, hit the beds for sleep and then took over the Municipal auditorium to get the feel of the tournament floor.

Winners of tomorrow night's games will meet for the Western honors Saturday. The champion will clash with the Eastern playoffs winner for the national NCAA in New York next Tuesday.

Consolation winners of the West and East also will meet in New York.

The two double-headers here will draw record crowds for the Western of about 9700 nightly. The playoffs have been a sellout since shortly after Kansas State's win over Oklahoma A. and M. here Monday.

Navy Hopes For Upset Held Slim

DENVER, March 18 (AP)—One, lone, navy blue darkhorse carries the last hopes for a really major upset into the quarter finals of the National AAU basketball tournament here tonight.

Seven of the eight seeded teams moved into the round of eight yesterday with only two having to get up any sweat doing it. Lone outsiders remaining were the Navy Blues from Annapolis, Md., a collection of former naval academy graduates who looked pretty dangerous while racing through Portland, Ore. (Semler Yanks) 74-46. Portland earlier had inflicted the only casualty in the seeded ranks by beating Milwaukee.

The sailors are paired tonight against Denver's Graybeards (Murphy-Mahoney), a seeded team of caddy veterans who aren't given much chance to take the title but who look too tall and strong for the smaller easterners.

Oakland (Bittners) was the only one of the "big four"—Bartlesville, Denver Nuggets, Oakland and Hollywood—which was hard pushed in the third round.

Teen-Agers To Go With Meissner
EUGENE, March 18 (AP)—Two teen-age ski enthusiasts are to accompany Jack Meissner on the last leg of his trip along the Cascade summit between Mount Hood and Crater lake.

Meissner has been resting at Odell lake and said before leaving today that Donald Temple, 17, of Oakridge, and Gilbert Bissell, 16, Eugene, would travel with him.

They hope to scale Diamond peak and Goshorn mountain along the route.

Civil Air Patrol Pilot Bob Pfeiffer of Eugene plans to drop supplies to the group at Diamond lake next Thursday. The party hopes to reach Crater lake by Easter Sunday.

Kegler Chief Gets 6 Month Suspension

DETROIT, March 18 (AP)—Buddy Bomar, captain of the world champion Kathryn bowling team of Chicago, was suspended for six months and fined \$500 last night by the Bowling Proprietors Association of America.

Bomar had been charged with violating the contract of a match in which his squad was defending its title against Detroit's E. & B. team, former world title holders.

The Detroit team, refusing to appear last Saturday for the second blocks of the title match, accused the Chicago pin star of working on the alleys in which his quintet was to roll.

An E. & B. spokesman said that violated the contract which stipulated that "no member of either team would be allowed to touch the alleys in any way with a rotary machine or alley brush 10 days prior to the match."

Action against Bomar was taken by BPAA President Tom Halligan of Flint, Mich., and five other members of the organization in an eight-hour session here.

The BPAA also ordered that the E. & B. team finish its second blocks in the title match.

The Detroit team, leading the Chicagoans by 592 pins when it halted the match, agreed to roll the second half.

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St. Louis Swamps New York

NEW YORK, March 18 (AP)—There wasn't any doubt today about the class of the St. Louis university basketball team and its stringbean center, All-America Ed Macauley.

The Billikens from the banks of the Mississippi put on a collective show last night to overwhelm New York university, 66-52, in the finale of the national invitation tournament at Madison Square Garden.

Six-foot-eight Ed, who looks as if he might snap in half at any moment, came up with a brilliant individual performance as the Bills gained a berth in the Olympic games trials.

Macauley poured in 24 points before he got tired shooting at the net and was content to feed his mates for the buckets that all but ran the NYU Violets purple-faced.

He was unanimously voted the tournament's most valuable player.

The preliminary consolation game, won by Western Kentucky, 61-59, after a rough overtime tussle with DePaul, provided most of the evening's thrills.

Walla Walla To Open "Y" Play
