

# GOP Solons Go Ahead On Tax Slash

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Thirty-two republican senators decided today to go ahead with the income tax cutting bill despite possible hoists in military expenditures.

Chairman Millikin (Colo.) said the GOP conference decided, without objection, to push for passage of a \$1,800,000,000 reduction bill.

Senate debate begins on the measure today. Millikin said he hopes it can be concluded this week.

President Truman asked congress yesterday for a universal military training law and temporary revival of the draft.

He said they also believe that the surplus will provide a good-sized payment on the national debt.

The republicans agreed, Millikin said, to oppose all major amendments to the tax cutting bill.

He listed these as: (1) a demerit substitute to cut only \$1,000,000,000; (2) a democratic proposal to restore the excess profits tax; (3) and a move to wipe out the oleomargarine tax.

He said the conference took no position on the merits of the alien tax. But he said an amendment to wipe it out would be opposed on the grounds that this action is not proper in the present bill.

Senator George (Ga.), ranking democrat on the senate finance committee, joined the republicans in forecasting easy senate passage of the tax bill.

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# Draft Could Be Working Very Quickly

SALEM, Ore., March 18 (AP)—Draft of men into the armed forces could begin within 45 to 60 days after congress passed a selective service law.

May Gen. Lewis B. Hershey said here late yesterday.

In an emergency, the national selective service director said, "we could begin drafting men quicker than 45 to 60 days, but that is the estimate based on the job being done in an orderly way."

The general said he heard President Truman's draft message yesterday on his car radio while driving to Salem. He said he did not know what kind of a draft law the president had in mind, but presumed it was for taking men in the 18-20 age group to make up the deficiency in voluntary enlistments.

He was here on a nation-wide inspection tour. Training schools for his staff and national guard procurement officers are now being held over the country, but they are part of the regular program and have nothing to do with current international problems, he said.

In the event of a draft, only 1,200,000 men—those who became 18 years old since last April 1—would need to register. The other men's records are already at hand, he said.

Hershey left here last night for Portland and planned to confer today with Gov. John Hall before going to Seattle.

# Four Persons Burn To Death In Rural Home Fire

ALBANY, Ore., March 18 (AP)—Four persons burned to death and a fifth was fatally injured in a fire which leveled a rural home near here last night.

Two others were critically hurt. Three of the 10 persons in the residence escaped with slight injuries.

The family had just moved into the house in the east Knox Butte community and was spending its first night there.

Deputy Coroner Walter Kropp said the bodies of four who died in the fire would be removed from the ruins today. They were Mrs. Annie Dunks, 43, two of her children, Charles Dunks, 11, and Verdon Dunks, 4, and Richard Dirting, 14, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Dirting, Toupet Wash., friends of the Dunks family.

Wallace Dunks Jr., 5 months old, was thrown from a bedroom window by his parents. Mr. and Mrs. Dunks, who then jumped and later took him to Doernbecher hospital in Portland. The infant died in the hospital early today with a fractured skull.

In critical condition in General Hospital here are Roy Dunks, 22, and Duiland Dunks, 17. Their brother Irvin, 20, a cripple, who dragged himself to a first floor bedroom window and escaped, also was under hospital treatment. His brother Wallace pulled him away from the house after he had gotten through the window.

Reuben F. Dunks, husband of the burned woman and father of two victims, was not at home last night. He was en route from Boise, where he had delivered a load of lumber. Police were attempting early today to locate him in Eastern Oregon.

Firemen reported cause of the blaze was not immediately determined. Deputy Coroner Irvin Dunks told of hearing someone yell "fire." He said the boy reported the family had left an oil heating stove burning overnight in a downstairs room.

# Oleo Tax Row To Be Investigated

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—The house agriculture committee voted 14-10 Wednesday to establish a subcommittee to investigate the oleomargarine tax controversy.

The group will make its first report to congress before next January 1.

The full committee voted 16 to 10 yesterday to shelve all legislation proposing to repeal the special taxes on oleomargarine.

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Elevation of four American priests to the Episcopacy was announced today by the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, apostolic delegate to the United States.

The Rev. Leo Fabian Fahy, pastor of Sacred Heart church, Hattiesburg, Miss., will be coadjutor with right of succession to Bishop Joseph F. McGrath of Baker City, Ore.

Born in Bay St. Louis, Miss., in 1898, Bishop-elect Fahy studied at St. Joseph's seminary, St. Benedict, La.; Kendrick seminary, Webster Grove, Mo.; the North American college in Rome, and the Catholic University of America. He was ordained at Bay St. Louis in 1926.

Others elevated: The Rev. Edward C. Daly to be bishop of Des Moines; the Rev. Leo John Steck to be auxiliary bishop of Salt Lake; and the Rev. John Francis Dearden to be coadjutor with right of succession to Bishop Hugh H. Boyle of Pittsburgh.
