

Scholarship Offered By Group To Stimulate More Men To Enter Teaching

Of interest to high school seniors, graduate college students or graduates who are eligible for scholarship, is the tuition scholarship project of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers.

This is a \$100 scholarship which will be paid at the beginning of the college term to the institution in which the student who was given the award, is registered. The purpose of the scholarship is to encourage more high school seniors, both boys and girls, to train for teaching in elementary public schools of the state of Oregon.

Training must take place in Oregon public tax-supported teacher training institutions of which there are three at the present time, Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, Eastern Oregon college at La Grande and Southern Oregon college at Ashland.

The applicant must agree to complete a full course in elementary teacher education and teach in the public elementary schools of Oregon at least one year for each year of scholarship award received, otherwise the awards will be considered a loan to be repaid to the Oregon Congress of PTA's. The scholarship may be renewed for the four years, upon application to the scholarship committee.

Awards will be based on scholastic record, character and personality, leadership, school citizenship and sound health. The scholarships will be restricted to those preparing to teach in the public elementary schools of Oregon.

Applicants should write at once to the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, 314 Education Center building, Portland 4, Oregon, and request an application form and three reference forms. This is to be filled in and along with a transcript of record, sent to the state office no later than April 15. A candidate must remember that all applications must be examined by the scholarship committee before awards can be granted.

That amount will buy bonds worth \$10,000 when they mature ten years from purchase.

Formerly, the maximum investment allowed in one year was \$3750, for bonds with a maturity value of \$5000.

EPHRATA, Wash., March 19 (AP)—The national "Miss America" beauty contest will not be restricted this year to girls "of the white race," chamber of commerce officials said Thursday.

Officials said the executive secretary of the contest committee had authorized nearby Omak to enter an Indian princess in the "Miss Washington" contest. This is one of the preliminaries to pick contenders for the "Miss America" crown in Atlantic City, N. J. next September. Previously only girls of the white race were permitted to enter the state and national contests.

Presley Watts, chairman of a chamber of commerce contest committee, said in Omak that his group had no particular Indian girl in mind.
