Indian Held On Charge Of Killing Child

Rebecca Drew McEneany of San Pablo, Calif., former Beatty resident, is awaiting arraignment in superior court at Martinez, Calif., on a charge of murder in the death of her 17-month-old niece, Catherine George, on March 8.

The little girl, daughter of Dorothy Drew George, now a patient at the Tacoma Indian hospital, died after what a California sheriff said was a beating inflicted by a coat-hanger and by slapping for allegedly misbehaving in her trailer home at San Pablo.

The child, who had been in her aunt's care while the mother was receiving treatment in Washington, is to be buried in graveside services at the Plute cemetery, Beatty, on Friday afternoon at 1:30. Ward's is in charge.

Klamath Indian reservation officials here today said that Rebecca McEneany is carried on the tribal rolls as a full Klamath, and the former Beatty woman is 24 years of age. She was born at Beatty.

Details of the murder were lacking here today but it is understood that an inquest was held in connection with the child's death, and that the little body showed brain damage, extensive bodily injuries and body blows, apparently administered "by a blunt instrument."

Juanita Heecoca of Beatty, said to be an aunt of Mrs. McEneany and Mrs. George, made an investigation of the affair at the suggestion of reservation officials. Harold McEneany, Rebecca's husband, was not involved. Dorothy George, mother of Catherine, was married at one time to Chrisman George who died May 6, 1944, according to county records.

Radio Music Contract OK'd

NEW YORK, March 19 (AP)—The American Federation of Musicians and the radio networks agreed Thursday on a new three-year contract that includes a provision permitting live music for television.

The agreement came after many weeks of negotiations between the networks and James C. Petrillo, president of the AFL Musicians' union.

It insures that there will be no interruption of radio network musical programs on March 31 when a 60-day extension of the old contract expires. The agreement also means that television will be able to carry live musical programs, including symphony orchestras, operas, musical comedies and popular bands.

Mac Asks For Farm Action

MILWAUKEE, March 19 (AP)—Farmers must be protected against oppressive government controls and inroads against liberties and free institutions, says Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

The general expressed his views on agriculture in a cablegram sent to Gavin McKerrow, chairman of a Wisconsin farm group. The group had asked MacArthur and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Harold E. Stassen, former Minnesota governor, for their farm views. The cablegram was signed "supreme commander, allied powers."

Three Draw Life For Beating

EUREKA, Calif., March 19 (AP)—Three men were sentenced to life imprisonment Thursday for kidnapping and beating a Eureka taxicab driver.

They were convicted last week by a superior court jury which recommended against possibility of parole.

The three, Vernon Flaschman, Richard Maxey and Darrel Bean, were charged with kidnapping Eugene Shephard, Eureka taxicab driver, last November and beating him into insensibility before throwing him from his car on a remote side road.

Washington Guard Clamp Goes On

OLYMPIA, March 19 (AP)—No member of the Washington National Guard may resign from the service except in cases of individual hardship or emergency.

The order was issued yesterday by Brig. Gen. Enaley M. Llewellyn, state adjutant general.

Present at the announcement was Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national selective service director, who paid his respects to Governor Wallgren while en route to Fort Lewis.

General Hershey, who was to be in Tacoma today and Seattle for the weekend, said the nation could be gaining drafting men within 45 to 60 days from records now available.

862 Businesses Start In State

SALEM, March 19 (AP)—Oregon gained 862 new business corporations during the year ended last June 30, bringing the total to 4836, State Corporation Commissioner Maurice Hudson said today.

The number of nonprofit corporations increased from 3690 to 3962, while the number of cooperative associations increased from 388 to 431.

Hudson said the number of out-of-state corporations doing business in Oregon increased from 1016 to 1115.

Plane To Be Used In Horse Roundup

WILBUR, Wash., March 19 (AP)—Hours of rugged range riding will be shortened this week when the airplane bows into an old-fashioned horse roundup.

The plane will be used to spot the bands of wild horses in South Ferry county.

The wranglers will sort out branded animals for their owners and take unbranded cayuses for their own use.

Hope Held In Atom Walkout

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The White House reported today there is a good chance of heading off a threatened midnight walkout of 900 atomic laboratory workers at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters "it is quite possible an agreement will be reached during the day."

Ross added that President Truman also has received "a very encouraging message from the union that if the status quo is maintained there will be no strike."

But Ross said that if a settlement is not reached, the provisions of the Taft-Hartley law "will be followed." This apparently meant that the government will seek a court injunction to ban a strike for 80 days.

Fare Boost Question Up

PORTLAND, March 19 (AP)—Who has authority to decide how much Portland street cars and buses can charge—the city or the state?

John Carkin, state public utilities commissioner, took the matter under advisement after Portland Traction company asked permission to raise fares here to a straight 10 cents a ride.

The company argues that the new motor transportation act gives the state jurisdiction over fares within a city. Portland City Commissioner Dorothy McCullough Lee, who has opposed the rate increases asked by the street car company, contends the city council still has jurisdiction.

Mrs. Lee charged that the company "has attempted to get out from under the city's control x x x in my opinion, the recent motor transportation act x x x in no way changed the jurisdiction of the city."

The state public utilities commissioner himself said he would have to study the question. "The law," commented Carkin, "is not very clear."

Churches Ask School Work

SALEM, March 19 (AP)—The Oregon Council of Churches asked today that religious classes be continued for Oregon public school students in school hours.

Attorney General George Neuner ruled yesterday that the classes cannot be held in schools, but left the way open for them to be conducted in other buildings.

A number of schools already hold the classes in buildings away from schools.

For the rest, Dr. Chester Hamblin, Salem Presbyterian pastor and president of the Oregon Council of Churches, said "in most cases it will be possible to find a church building near the school where classes may be held."
