

Lunches Served In City Schools Prove Both Good And Varied For Students

School district one includes Conner, Fairview, Fremont, Mills, Pelican, Riverside and Roosevelt schools. The lunch rooms in these places serve daily a type A plate lunch for which students and teachers are charged twenty-five cents. A government reimbursement of three cents per plate is allowed on lunches to children only. A type A lunch is designed to furnish about one-third of a child's daily food needs and must supply, in accordance with federal standards, the following:

- 1/2 pint milk
- 2 ounces of a protein-rich food such as meat, eggs, cheese, etc.
- 1/2 cup of vegetable and/or fruit
- 1 piece whole grain or enriched bread with butter or fortified margarine

Between eight and nine hundred students and about one hundred teachers are served in the above lunch rooms each day. There are fourteen paid whole or part time employees and eight and one-half cents for each plate served goes for labor. Lunch receipts are expected to cover food and labor costs. No profit is planned or intended.

All receipts are deposited to school district one and all funds are administered by the district through the clerk's office. These lunch rooms are operated as a unit by district one under supervision paid by that district. No school serving both type A and type B lunches on the same day is eligible for government reimbursement. Klamath Union high school, district two, is therefore without aid as the lunch room serves, in addition to the type A plate lunch, filled sandwiches, soup, fruit, deserts made in the kitchen and ice cream. A combination of some of these, with milk, constitutes the type B lunch. The price of the plate, without dessert but including one half pint milk and one piece of bread and butter, remains at twenty-five cents. To meet increased costs in recent months, it has been necessary to increase the price charged for deserts made in the kitchen and half pints of milk, not served with the plate.

Neither students nor cashiers being willing to cope with confusion and delay caused by odd change such as seven cents, which was tried, prices on these two items have been set at ten cents. However, students may purchase milk tickets for one dollar payable in advance which allow fifteen half pints of milk. A deposit of five cents must be made on each milk bottle, which brings the original cost of one half pint with straw to a fraction under eleven cents. Most bottles are returned but a considerable number are broken or carried from the cafeteria and these represent a straight loss of five cents each to the cafeteria. Students who bring lunches from home and buy milk only, are allowed full use of lunch room supplies and facilities such as napkins, flatware, tumblers, table space, etc. while facilities are cared for and kept in shape by employees paid from lunch receipts, five in all. About nine cents of each thirty-five cent service goes for labor.

Between three hundred and fifty and four hundred students and about thirty-five teachers are served daily. Of this number, around two hundred and twenty-five take the plate or type A lunch. No profit is planned or intended. All receipts are deposited to school district two through the clerk's office. This lunch room, like those in district one, is operated by the district under paid supervision.

Parents are not only invited, but urged to visit the lunch rooms.

Row Raised Over Running Of New Dam

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—Funds for Folsom dam in California were jeopardized today by a disagreement over which government agency will operate the project.

The house has approved \$1,000,000 for preliminary work by the army engineers.

The project is authorized as a flood control project. Meanwhile, legislation is pending in the house to transfer its operation to the reclamation bureau after it is built.

Two members of the senate appropriations subcommittee on army civil functions said yesterday they believe the appropriation should be held up until the operation policy is decided.

Senator Overton (D-La.) said he is opposed to making the army engineers an agent of the reclamation bureau. He added that it is proper for the army engineers to build the dam and operate it, turning over excess water and power to the reclamation bureau for distribution.

Senator Gordon (R-Ore.) said he will be guided by the desire of California. However, he said, if the project is to be a reclamation bureau operation, it should be provided for in the interior department appropriation bill.

Chiang Says Hour Of Decision Here

NANKING, March 19 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek said Thursday this is the "hour of decision" in the government's campaign to defeat the communists in Central China.

"Unless an all-out effort is made to turn the tide of war in Central China, the last reservoir of Kuomintang (government party) power faces complete collapse," he told a conference of military leaders and governors of six central provinces.

Stowaways Off For Venezuela

SEATTLE, March 19 (AP)—Six Spanish stowaways left here by plane Thursday for Los Angeles where they are to board a ship for Venezuela.

The stowaways, who said they are refugees from Franco Spain, arrived in this country last September aboard the steamship Arthur P. Fairfield.

The immigration service had prepared to deport them to France, where they had stowed away.

A \$5000 fund raised by public donations in California, Oregon and Washington is to be used to pay their transportation and five-month board bill in the immigration station here.

R. P. Bonham, director of the station, said about \$4000 of the fund will have been spent by the time the men reach their destination. Venezuela has agreed to accept them with documents in place of passports.

wheel of a tractor, with color in his cheeks again. And he'd traded the night life of the city for a quiet glass of beer with Dad.

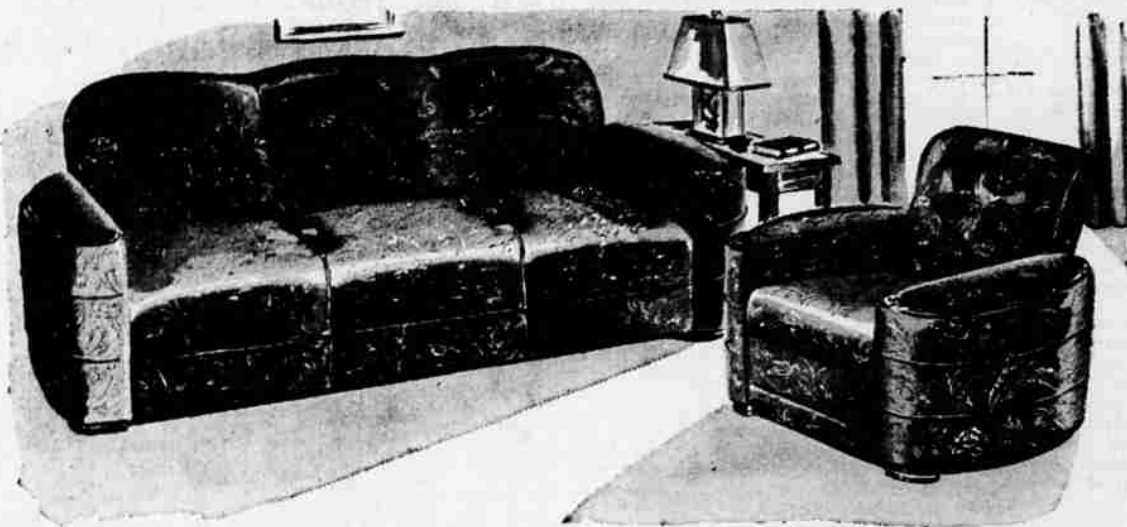
