

MARKETS and FINANCIAL GRAINS IN LOWER TERRITORY

CHICAGO, March 20 (AP)—Grains sold in lower territory during most of the session on the board of trade today. At one time May wheat, target of the selling movement, was down around 4 cents. But part of this loss was cancelled on a moderate rally late in the day.

Selling in wheat was mainly a continuation of yesterday's liquidation, based on reports of heavy offerings of cash wheat to the government at Kansas City.

Corn eased with wheat, despite an agriculture department announcement that farmers intend to plant less acreage than the official 1948 goal. Oats were mostly lower on rumors Canadian oats may be exported to this country, but late in the session deferred months climbed above the previous close.

Wheat closed 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 lower, May \$2.31 1/2-\$2.31, corn was 1/2 to 2 cents lower, May \$2.11 1/2-\$2.11, oats were 1/4-1/2 lower, May \$1.08 1/2-\$1.08, and soybeans were 2 cents lower to 3 cents higher, May \$3.40.

Bull Move Takes Market

NEW YORK, March 20 (AP)—Stocks today resumed their bullish sweep in one of the fastest Saturday markets of the past year.

Shortly after the opening the high speed ticker tape, for an interval, fell as much as two minutes behind actual floor transactions for the first time since early December. Gains of 1 to 4 points were registered.

Professionals who bought on Tuesday's slump were quick to cash profits. Dealings slowed and extreme advances were trimmed in most cases. Prices again stiffened near the close. Transfers of around 900,000 shares were among the largest for a short session since last May.

The buying surge again was credited to expectations that big-scale rearmament, government stock-piling and quick passage of the European relief program would do much to prop industry.

Brokers reported that, while some customers followed trading elements and broadened commitments, many continued to stand aside pending more light on confusing international affairs and the overall economic picture.

Ostendorf OK's Time Switch

Mayor Ed Ostendorf has added his okay in a poll conducted by the League of Oregon Cities to determine how many Oregon mayors favor daylight saving time.

Mayor Ostendorf said that he is very much in favor of daylight time and will do all possible to make it effective here should other portions of the state accept it.

Robert L. Elstrom, mayor of Salem and president of the league, has sent out questionnaires to 152 mayors in the state, and of the 100 who have answered so far, a wide majority favors daylight time.

Daylight time, if adopted in Oregon, will have to be accepted through municipalities. Governor John Hall has announced that a statewide vote is a legislative function, and not in his jurisdiction.
