Here's How Hot Springs Hill Looked In Its Early Stages

When Klamath Falls began to "grow up" about the end of this century's first decade, there was a definite movement in the direction of the Hot Springs district, which had some high-powered promotion behind it. It was after two or three years of this development that the Baldwin studio took the picture presented today as another of the Photographic History series.

The picture looks down Esplanade street from the Hot Springs area toward the town, which was still clustered near Link river. But trees had been planted on either side of Esplanade and the development out there was under way.

Behind this promotion was the Klamath Development company, which was organized about 1910. D. B. Campbell originally bought the Hot Springs property, and sold to S. O. and W. Paul Johnson, who set up the Klamath Development company. They later took in G. X. Wendling as a partner, and ultimately sold to Mortimer and Herbert Fleishacker, San Francisco capitalists.

The KD company went at things in a big way. It built the White Pelican hotel at Main and Esplanade to help speed the movement toward its property; it figured strongly in the battle to erect a courthouse on the present site of the high school, and it put up its office building at Main and Broad. Its Klamath office was in the KD building there for a long time, with the San Francisco office in the Flood building.

Esplanade street, shown in the picture, was the first street developed into the Hot Springs district. Pacific Terrace followed as a major residential street there.

Those interested in the changes which can take place in 35 years should drive to Esplanade and Pacific Terrace, and compare the view with this old-time picture.

MOSCOW, March 20 (AP)—The publication Moscow Bolshevik reported today the case of a Muscovite sentenced to one year in jail for making bootleg vodka out of sugar.

The prosecutor charged that operation of the illegal distillery was "socially dangerous under new conditions following the abolition of the rationing system."

Return Of Trieste To Italy Eyed

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—United States, Britain and France today proposed the return of the territory of Trieste to Italy through a major revision of the Italian peace treaty.

The proposal was made on behalf of the American government to the Russian and Italian emissaries here. Trieste is an important port city and ship-building center on the Adriatic sea between Italy and Yugoslavia.

Under the Italian peace treaty, Trieste was established as a free territory under the protection of the United Nations.

Today's joint announcement of the Western powers said this plan for an independent Trieste is not working out very well.

It said Yugoslavia already has virtually incorporated that area of the territory occupied by Yugoslav troops.

The proposal to "place the free territory of Trieste once more under Italian sovereignty" apparently is a major move by the West to force a change in Italian political strategy. The Italians are to hold a national election April 18 with a communist bid for power the big issue.

The Western powers' decision to propose return of Trieste to Italy was attributed to two main causes: 1. "Discussions in the security council have already shown that agreements on the selection of a governor for Trieste is impossible." The peace treaty provides that a governor for the new free territory should be chosen by the UN security council.

2. The three powers "have received abundant evidence to show that the Yugoslav zone has been completely transformed in character and has been virtually incorporated into Yugoslavia by procedures which do not respect the desire expressed by the powers to give an independent and democratic status to the territory."

Swartzfager was arrested yesterday afternoon at Sprague River, while Wilcher was located early last night at the Shippington mill. The former was arraigned in justice court yesterday and bail was set at \$1000.

Wallace Blasts Red Label Again

NEW YORK, March 20 (AP)—President Truman, Henry A. Wallace says, has placed the communist brand on all those who oppose his policies of "militarism" and "support our fight for peace."

The third party presidential candidate spoke over a radio network (MBS) last night in answer to Mr. Truman's St. Patrick's Day declaration that he would not "accept the support of Henry Wallace and his communists." His broadcast was the second on consecutive nights in reply to the two speeches made last Wednesday by the president.

Wallace accused President Truman of trying to give the impression that only communists disapproved his policies of "supporting peace, kings and reactionaries around the world" and his plans to "draft our young men and militarize the country."

"But millions of Americans, who stand firmly opposed to his policies, know that they are not communists and they will not be frightened into accepting militarism because someone called them 'communists,'" (he former vice president said.)

Wallace also attacked the proposal of Warren Austin, chief U. S. delegate to the United Nations, for a temporary UN trusteeship over Palestine rather than partition.

"Today the United States shocked the world by abandoning her support of the United Nations decision to partition Palestine," he said.

Wallace added that unless Americans "keep our word and carry out decisions arrived at," the U. S. stands to lose all "the great moral leadership" it held at the end of the last war.

Fire Cuts Off Portland Power

PORTLAND, March 20 (AP)—Fire in the basement of the Pittock block shut off all direct current in downtown Portland at noon Friday.

Elevators stalled, newspaper presses stopped and wire service teletype operation was affected. Radio stations reported no difficulty.

The Pacific Power and Light company reported that one of its four 3,000-horsepower motors and one of two turbo generators burned and the plant was shut down.

Ski Prospect Held Poor

It will take a lot of traffic on slopes and trails at Crater Lake national park this week-end to make the skiing any good, rangers reported this morning. Nine and one-half inches of fresh snow fell last night and 150 inches covers the park area.

Snow was falling lightly at the Annie Springs ranger station at 11 a. m. but a heavier snow with a strong wind was reported from the rim. The temperatures of the past 24 hours were not encouraging, with a maximum of 22 Friday; 14 early this morning and only 16 at 11 a. m. At least two feet of new snow has fallen in the park area during the past week.

Chains are mandatory from Annie Springs to the rim and although roads are plowed open there is a heavy pack on the highways throughout the park. Rangers suggested that chains be used in all cross-park travel this week-end. The ski tow will operate Sunday but chances for good, fast skiing were poor.

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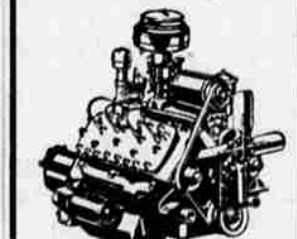
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
