

# Specialist Talks To Business Club

"A Modern Approach to Dental Caries" was the subject of a talk by Dr. John Negrevski, DDS, specialist in children's dentistry, when he spoke to Business and Professional Women's club at their dinner meeting March 15 at the Willard hotel.

He stated children living in the Pacific Coast states have the highest attach rates of dental caries in this country, the average being seven cavities each year. This is due largely to absence of fluorine in the soil and water. Experiments are being conducted in Grand Rapids, Mich., by the addition of fluorine to the city water supply, and should they be successful in lowering incidence of dental caries there, it is hoped cities throughout the country will eventually add fluorine to their water supplies. Until such a time, more and better education of parents is necessary, he said. Nutrition plays an important part in the prevalence of tooth decay among children. It has been proven that a diet consisting of meat, eggs, cheese, fruit, vegetables and milk, low in carbohydrates, and an absence of beverages and sweets, will aid in good tooth formation and lower the attach rate of dental caries from 50 to 75 per cent, the speaker added.

Dr. Negrevski stated that as far as teeth are concerned, one perfect place to live has been discovered in this country. In Deaf Smith county, Texas, because of the prevalence of fluorine in the water and soil, none of its citizens have ever developed a tooth cavity.

Dr. Negrevski's talk was followed by a question period, which proved most informative. Two films from the Oregon state board of health were shown, "To the People of the U. S. A.," and "Our Job To Know." Both films dealt with facts regarding social diseases. Projector for the films was loaned by the audio-visual education department of school district No. 1, Glen Lorenz, KUHS senior, was the operator.

This program was arranged by Annis Struthers, club health and safety chairman. She also conducted a "health quiz," which when answered and tabulated, determined the health status of each one present.

Dorothy Ackerman led group singing of Irish songs in honor of St. Patrick's Day. The next dinner meeting on April 5 will be the annual "birthday party" for which special entertainment is being arranged.
