

MARKETS and FINANCIAL GRAINS SHOW GOOD GAINS

CHICAGO, March 22 (AP)—Grains moved higher on the board today. The market was lower at the start, but quickly rallied above the previous close. Corn led the advance.

Reports of weakness in cash wheat at both Minneapolis and Kansas City did not have much influence on futures. The basis on spring wheat at Minneapolis was down 2 to 4 cents a bushel while at Kansas City No. 1 hard wheat sold at 19 cents over the May future against 22 cents Saturday.

The commodity Credit Corporation announced wheat purchases at Kansas City, Minneapolis and Chicago, but the periods over which the buying was made differed.

The Chicago office bought 605,000 bushels from noon Thursday to noon Friday. Minneapolis bought 50,000 from noon Friday to noon Saturday, and Kansas City bought 1,325,000 from noon Thursday to noon Friday. It was said the Kansas City Saturday buying would be made public tomorrow.

According to trade reports, offerings to the CCC at Kansas City again were heavy today.

Wheat closed 2 to 3 1/2 higher, May \$2.34 1/2, corn was 2 1/4-4 1/2 higher, May \$2.15-2.16, oats were 1 1/4-4 1/2 higher, May \$1.11 1/2-1 1/4, and soybeans were 5 cents lower to 4 cents higher, May \$3.44.

Market Shows Some Gains

NEW YORK, March 22 (AP)—Strong spots persisted in today's stock market on one of the largest volumes of the past year although many leaders faltered.

Profit cashing in the wake of the recent bulge appeared after a speedy opening. While gains running to a point or more were widely distributed near the close, the minus column was widely populated.

For a good part of the initial hour the ticker tape was as much as 3 minutes late for the first time since last May. Blocks of 1000 to 6000 shares were numerous. The first hour total of 730,000 shares was a top since December, 1946. The pace subsequently slackened as prices wavered but turnover at about 2,000,000 shares were among the best since mid-April a year ago.

Inclined to stumble were Santa Fe, Southern Railway, Northern Pacific, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Caterpillar Tractor, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Lockheed, Anacosta and Standard Oil (N.J.).

In front most of the time were Du Pont, General Electric, Union Carbide, Allied Chemical, Johnson & Johnson, Eastman Kodak, Goodrich, Firestone Tire, Goodyear, Deere, American Smelting, Twentieth Century-Fox, Loew's, United Fruit, American Airlines, Union Pacific and Atlantic Coast Line.
