

Concerts To Close With Duo-Pianists

Klamath music lovers will turn out tonight, Wednesday, when Appleton and Field, duo-pianists, appear at the Pelican theatre, in the last of the season's series of Community Concert association presentations.

Vera Appleton and Michael Field studied together under Carl Friedberg at the Juillard graduate school of music. Later the two went their separate ways until a chance meeting one day in New York. Four months after their accidental reunion, their Town Hall debut won acclaim from music critics, and they were on their way.

Concert tours, radio and movie work, recording, writing and teaching have provided a busy schedule for the two. This marks their fifth concert season.

The program tonight will include a wide variety of selections, the Scherzo Characteristique by Franz Schubert, Variations on a Theme of Beethoven by Camille Saint-Saens, the popular Babre Dance of Khatkoutourian, and Rachmaninoff's Romance from the Second Suite for Two Pianos.

Tickets will not be available at the door, and only those who hold Community Concert association memberships will be admitted.

The concert begins at 8 o'clock in the Pelican theatre.
