WEATHER

KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY: Partly cloudy tonight. Thursday partly cloudy, becoming cloudy by evening. High today about 50. Low tonight 33. High Thursday 42.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA: Rain in south and showers in north today and tonight. Partly cloudy in north and showers in south Thursday. Snow above 4000 feet. Cooler. Fresh southwest winds off coast.

WESTERN OREGON: Mostly cloudy with showers of rain in valleys and snow in mountainous areas and tonight. Increasing cloudiness with rain Thursday. Slightly cooler in north today with afternoon highs of 45 to 50. Lows tonight 30 to 40. Moderate to occasionally fresh southeast winds off coast.

EASTERN OREGON: Mostly cloudy with showers of rain and snow today, tonight and Thursday. Little change in temperature. Afternoon highs 38 to 45. Lows tonight 28 to 33.
