

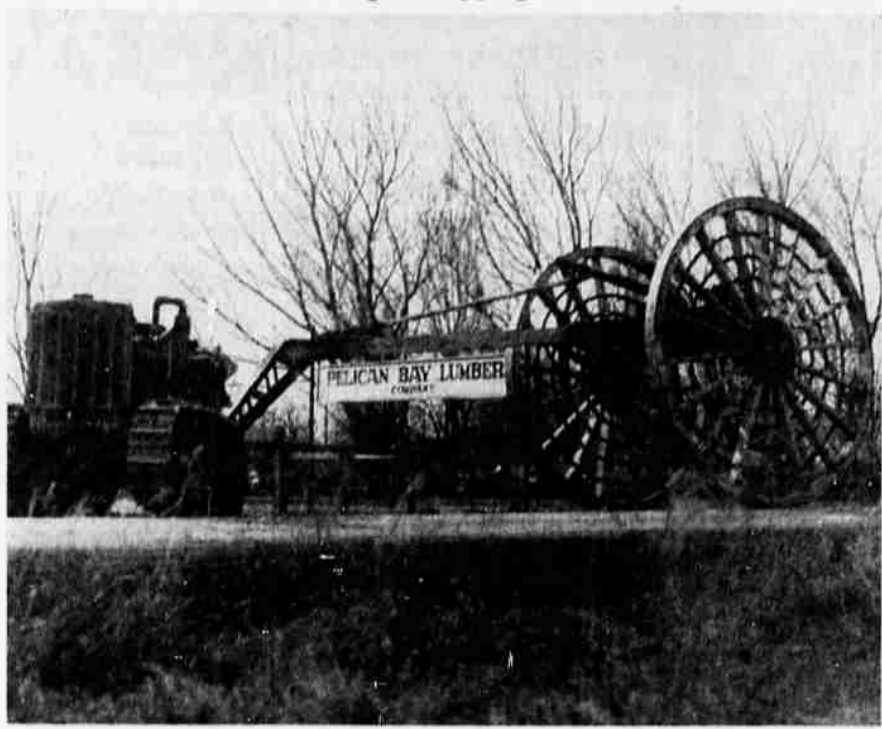
Park Museum Gets Oldtime Logging Gear

One of the last public spirited acts of the late Harold D. Mortenson, founder of the Pelican Bay Lumber company was a presentation to the logging museum at the recently dedicated Collier State park.

The contribution to the museum includes a set of big wheels and a gasoline tractor used in early logging operations in the Klamath country. The tractor, weighing five tons, replaced a six-horse team which was used to draw the huge wooden, iron-bound wheels for hauling logs.

Collier park is located in the Wood River valley country. Notice of the gift was received here last week, just prior to word of the death of the donor, who passed away in San Francisco on Sunday, March 21, at the age of 67. For years, the wheels and tractor have stood at the gates of the lumber company yards, just north of Klamath Falls.

Hypnotism Cures Vet

BALTIMORE, March 24 (AP)—A judge decided that hypnotism has brought Wilbur Shattuck's mind back to America and 1948, after a series of lapses in which the veteran thought he was still fighting Japs in the South Pacific.

Shattuck was also cleared yesterday of charges that he stole a radio from his boss last fall. Psychiatrists said he believed he was carrying an ammunition case—about the same size as the radio—to his besieged buddies on Bougainville island.

Judge Joseph Sherbow was told how Shattuck stumbled over imaginary underbrush and slipped at imaginary flies while under the influence of hypnotists at a veterans administration hospital here. Dr. Jacob H. Conn, court staff member assigned to the Shattuck case last December, told how he watched the awestruck veteran relive the horrors of war, and describe the death of a mortar squad while he berated himself for not bringing ammunition.

Yesterday Dr. Conn announced: "He is now completely cured, your honor. He is now ready to return to work x x x"

Chinese Newspapers Shut Down Today

PEIPING, Wednesday, March 24 (AP)—All three newspapers at Peiping, city of 120,000 and the capital of Hopeh province, have shut down. Publishers explained it wasn't worth while to continue publication because their maximum profit was limited to 20,000,000 Chinese dollars a month.

Oregon Pioneer Passes At 87

YAKIMA, March 24 (AP)—Mrs. Lucinda D. Johnson, 87, who came to Oregon in a covered wagon in 1863, died here yesterday. With her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Dille, she settled in the Willamette valley. They moved to the Astoria valley 15 years later and for the last 45 years she has lived at Naches.

Oil Plant Sites Eyed

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—Washington and Oregon are being studied by the interior department for possible sites for proposed synthetic fuel oil plants.

C. Charard Davidson, assistant secretary of the department, wrote Senator Cain (R-Wash.) today it was being done. He said preliminary studies to determine suitable regions for construction of the proposed plants is under way.

Cain had asked the department to look into the coal deposits of the Pacific Northwest.

"I told the department," he said, "that coal reserves in Washington state total 50 billion tons and that in Oregon they total one billion tons. I asked that a study be made of those deposits to determine feasible means of using them."

The proposal for construction of a synthetic fuel plants is pending in congress.

SPOKANE, March 24 (AP)—The farmer whose wife borrows his razor blades to cut linoleum had a chance to get even today. He has an excuse to borrow the vacuum cleaner.

Use of the vacuum to clean the threshing machine of old seeds was recommended yesterday to the Spokane County Crop Improvement association by Paul Fraser of the state department of agriculture.

Seeds remaining from previous crops contaminate more seed than any other single step of the seed business, Charles Gaines, Mount Vernon seed specialist, told the association.

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Used Car Prices To Go Up Again

DETROIT, March 24 (AP)—If you want a little more for your used car you'll have to wait another six weeks. If you want top price you probably will get it about June 15.

Whatever else may be said about the used car market it is not falling apart. It had a tough winter but prices are moving upward, especially for Chevrolets, Fords and Plymouths. Late models of these makes still are bringing more than list prices in many instances.

All indications are the early summer weeks will bring a heavy demand for used cars. The present rate of new car production, although rapidly nearing prewar normal levels, will not fill the coming summer demand. That means the used car lots will get a lot of business, especially between June 1 and the end of July.

In those two months the factories may turn out 700,000 passenger cars; but barring an unexpected cut in buying power there will be 5,000,000 persons still seeking automobiles. Most of them will want cars in June, July and August. For the most part they'll have to get them from the used car lots.

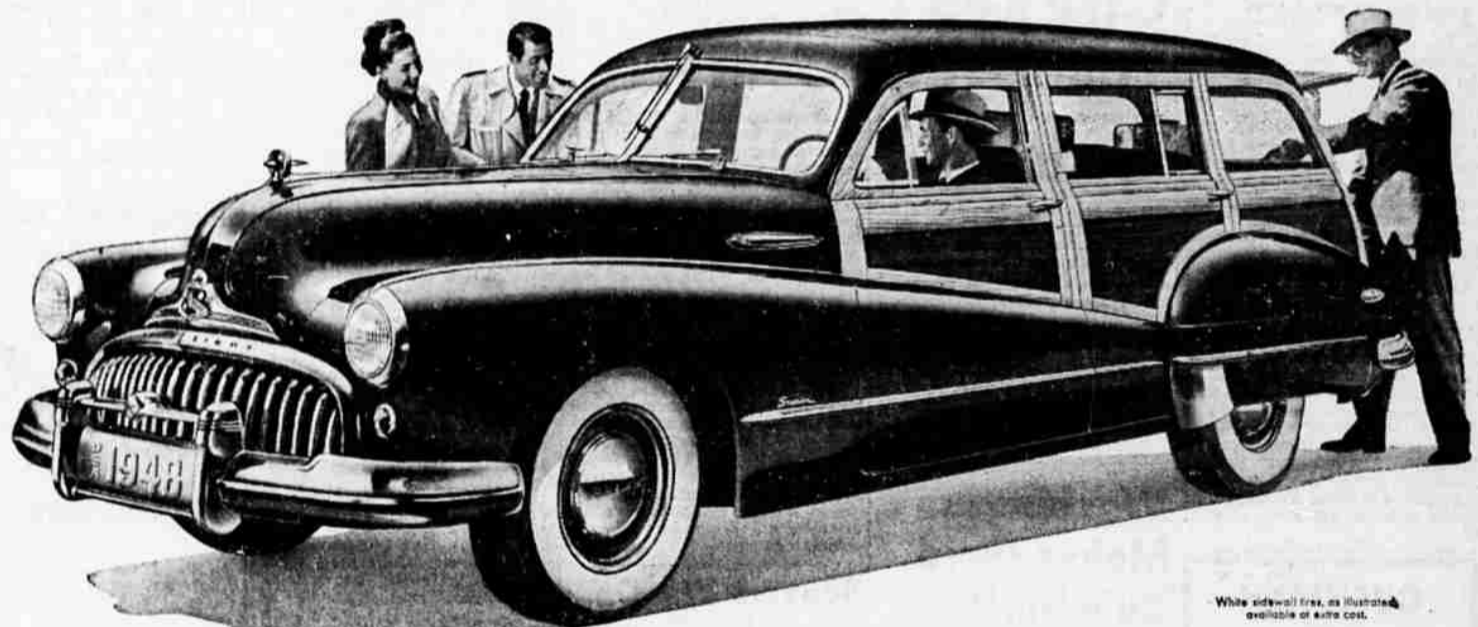
