

Quick End Sought To Coal Strike

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—President Truman said today he will take whatever steps are necessary—and possible under the law—to settle the coal strike.

He made that comment to a news conference when asked about the board he has appointed to determine the facts in the dispute.

The board was appointed, Mr. Truman explained, when the federal mediation and conciliation service failed to get an agreement between the coal industry and the United Mine workers.

Follows Law
The president said he is following the law when asked if he plans any appeal to the coal miners to return to work.

The fact-finding board has until April 5 to make its report. The president said he believes its members will speed their decision.

"After that?" a reporter asked.

The president said when the board reports he will take any action that is necessary under the law.

After the board reports, the government can go to the courts and ask an order halting the strike.

The government was reported drafting new coal savings orders.

Federal officials still hoped the United Mine workers chief, John L. Lewis, would call his 400,000 soft coal diggers back to work before the shortage becomes acute. But they were not counting on it.

Eugene Carpenters End Long Tie-Up

EUGENE, March 25 (AP)—AFL carpenters here have accepted a \$1.95 an hour wage offer by general contractors in a settlement that ends a two-month-old labor dispute.

A. W. Muir, member of the national carpenters' union executive board, said a majority of the union members voted acceptance of the offer.

The union had asked \$2 an hour for journeymen carpenters. The previous minimum was \$1.75.

Seattle Tailors Back On The Job

SEATTLE, March 25 (AP)—Things were looking up today for the Seattle Easter parade.

About 90 tailors and helpers have returned to work after being on strike since Monday.

Albert Dieterle, business agent of local 71, journeymen tailors' union (CIO) said members voted about four to one to accept a 12½ cent hourly wage increase offered by the Retail Clothiers' association. The boost brings journeyman pay to \$1.67½ cents an hour.

Final Farm Hearing Set

SPOKANE, March 25 (AP)—The touring congressional committee on agriculture headed by Representative Clifford R. Hope, Kansas, will open its eleventh and final hearing tomorrow morning in Spokane.

Congressman Hope confirmed today that a hearing scheduled for Fresno, Calif. has been cancelled. Need for attention to European relief legislation was given as the reason for cutting the tour short.

The members of the committee will return to Washington, D. C. immediately after the day-long session tomorrow.

Nearly 120 farmers have asked to appear before the group to give their opinions on a long range agricultural plan. A committee spokesman said today that number will be the largest of the tour if they can all be heard.
