

RC Group To Visit Salem

Otto Smith, Klamath County Red Cross disaster chairman, has named members to work on his committee preparatory to attending a state conference in early April in Salem. Purpose of the meeting will be to coordinate disaster relief facilities and agencies on a state-wide basis. City and county plans will be formed after the meeting.

Smith, Rev. David F. Barnett and Mrs. Frances Palmer will attend the session from Klamath Falls.

Vice chairman of the disaster committee is Sheriff Lloyd L. Lov. Others are Dr. Neil Black, medical section, assisted by Mrs. Phyllis Russell, registered nurse; Helen Stine, county home demonstration agent, who heads the emergency feeding section; C. S. Elliot, emergency clothing; Mrs. John Miller, communications; Muriel Rust, transportation; Arnold L. Gralapp, shelter; George Connor, publicity and radio communications; Jean Deachorn, registration and information, and Mrs. Frances Palmer, rehabilitation work.

The program will be coordinated with city, county and state law officers who handle actual emergency rescue work, with the Red Cross taking over for emergency care after rescue.

Cow Killing Order Vetoed

TILLAMOOK, March 26 (AP)—A group of Tillamook dairymen resisted today a state order to kill cattle showing signs of bang's disease.

The disease (brucellosis) causes undulant fever in humans. The state has set up control measures for cattle that react positively to bang's disease tests.

E. L. Peterson, state director of agriculture, said seven dairymen here failed to dispose of cattle that did not pass the bang's test. He said the law required such cattle to be killed.

The dairymen contended that killing of the cattle was not an effective control against the disease.

District Attorney Warren A. McMinnis, on Peterson's request, said he would start a court test against the dairymen in the next two weeks.

Ben Mills, president of a dairymen's group organized to oppose the regulations, said, "we are willing to let them test our cattle and brand our reactors, but if they insist upon killing the cattle, we'll take it to court and test the constitutionality of the law."

ESCAPE

NEW YORK, March 26 (AP)—Three mental patients described by police as "dangerous" escaped early today from Manhattan state hospital on Ward's island in the East river. One was recaptured soon afterwards.

A hospital guard was severely beaten after the three men had sawed through the steel bars of a room.

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Yost Announces Platform For Siskiyou Supervisor

George Yost, who is running for supervisor of district No. 1 in Siskiyou county, emphasized the importance of tax reduction in a statement of his campaign today. Yost is a Tulelake farmer and warehouse owner, who is opposing Gordon Jacobs, incumbent, and Jim Stevenson of Macdoel, in the commissioner race in Siskiyou. The election is June 1.

Upon announcing my candidacy for supervisor of district one, I promised a statement of my aims and ideas. Having made no promises to any individual or organization, I will go into office without the usual handicaps of a politician. As I have curtailed my farming activities considerably, I will, therefore, have sufficient time to devote to the affairs of the county.

In my estimation, the taxes of the county are too high now. My tax statement was the main reason for my decision to run for the office. With prospective price declines in agriculture, it may be difficult for us to pay higher taxes.

I question whether our money is being spent as efficiently as possible. Antiquated gas burning road machinery and inefficient and unskilled operators, add up as extravagant use of our funds. If elected, I propose to see that those county employees, under my jurisdiction, render real service.

I also propose to work for more efficiency in the county farm advisers' office. This could be a very useful institution in a county such as this. I think that this could be best accomplished by a change in personnel. I am sure someone could be found who would be more active and responsive to our needs. There is no reason why the agricultural departments of Siskiyou, Modoc and Klamath counties should not cooperate to solve some of our problems that affect all these counties, such as plant disease and weed control.

I expect to make regular pre-announced visits to all the centers of population, such as Dorris, Tennant, Montague, Hornbrook and Tulelake. This will be to give citizens an opportunity to register kicks

and make suggestions as to how the district should be run.

Lastly, I think that the business transacted by the board of supervisors should be made public and given to the newspapers. You should know what goes on in your county.

Truman Keeps Calif. Lead

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 26 (AP)—President Truman appears still to have the support of a majority of California's 62 delegates to the democratic national convention.

Urgently summoned here yesterday by State Chairman James Roosevelt, the democrats met secretly for four hours. There were rumblings of a delegate split on supporting the president for the party nomination.

After the meeting, they declared California's delegation was firmly pledged to President Truman and the meeting had been called for a "thorough discussion of the political situation."

A press release said the participants in the conference would campaign actively for the party's nominee and its platform.

None of the 42 delegates who attended the meeting would discuss it. The press release blasted the Wallace third party movement.

The state senate committee on un-American activities meantime charged by the independent progressive party of California (IPP) and its leaders "have followed and now follow the communist party pattern with unbroken monotony."

BPA Power Funds Asked

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Rep. Norblad (R-Ore.) asked a house appropriations subcommittee today for money to increase distribution of Bonneville power in the first Oregon congressional district.

He requested funds for: constructing Forest Grove terminal facilities; the McMinnville substation; the former installation; additions and more equipment at Salem substation; a connecting transmission line between Forest Grove and McMinnville; the Canby tap line and the Independence substation.

Norblad said that the Bonneville plant of the Bonneville power administration is overloaded and additional power must be supplied from Grand Coulee power plant.

He said high transmission lines must run from Grand Coulee to the Willamette Valley-Eugene, Ore. area and asked money for them.

He also asked approval of \$3,700,000 for operation and maintenance of the Bonneville power system.

Slayer Of Youth Faces Murder Rap

NEW YORK, March 26 (AP)—A first-degree murder indictment was returned yesterday against Marko L. Markovich, 65, charged with the street shooting of a Catholic school-boy last week.

Markovich, quoted by authorities as saying he wanted "to kill Catholics," opened fire on a group of Catholic school students, killing Thomas Brady, 16, and wounding six others.

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Angell Blasts Red Shipping

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) has asked President Truman in a letter to stop shipment to Russia of all items which could increase her military strength.

The Oregonian made the letter public today. In it he said that congress has given the president authority to "control such exports."

"The people of my district are aroused," Angell wrote, "over the program of the government to give aid to Russia through such shipments on one hand and send tax dollars in billions overseas to stop Russia and prevent spread of communism on the other hand."

Angell said he had information that during January and February lubricating oils, mining machinery, automobiles and parts, construction machinery, aluminum sulphate, metal working machinery and industrial machinery were exported to Russia in large quantities.

A group of Hawley residents, Dr. Porter said, banded together when they learned of the boy's condition and began collecting funds to provide him with "everything his little heart desires on Easter."

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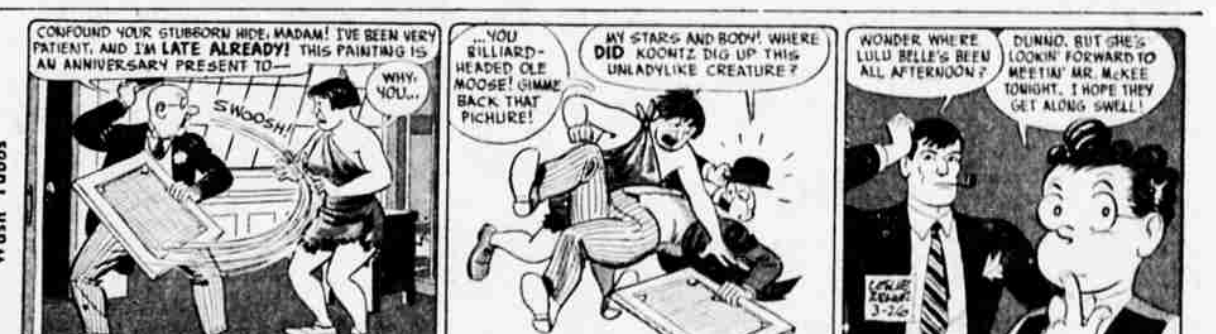
