Suspect Held In Nevada Rape Slaying

PETALEUMA, Calif., March 26 (AP)—Police today seized a travel-weary youth with a social security card made out to Laszlo Varga—the suspect sought as the accused rapist-slayer of a Wells, Nev., minister's wife.

Police Captain Del Cole said the youth, who had just arrived by bus, was pock-marked and fitted the description of the suspect hunted by California and Nevada authorities on a murder warrant.

Laszlo Varga, 19, a Hungarian war refugee, has been charged with the murder of the minister's wife, Mrs. Billie Rahe Morning, 22. She was raped and killed in her home at Wells last Monday.

The minister's wife, five months pregnant, was tied to a bed, her body stripped of clothing and bitten and she was raped after which she was beaten to death with a rolling pin.

Varga was named in a murder warrant as the itinerant who called at her door that day while her husband was preaching in a nearby town. Nevada police identified him as a former inmate of a Ypsilanti, Mich., mental institution.

The youth arrested here will be detained pending arrival of federal bureau of investigation agents.

He was taken into custody by three Petaluma officers shortly after his arrival early this morning on a northbound bus. He was walking along North Green street when the officers stopped him. He was unarmed and offered no resistance.

Cole said the description of the murder suspect tallied closely with that of the man picked up here. He was wearing a pin-striped suit. Nevada authorities said the slayer suspect was wearing such a suit when last seen.

Police Sergeant Elnor Matson said the man appeared to have been traveling under difficulties. He did not elaborate.

Health Groups Inspect Gear At Newell

TULELAKE, Calif., March 26—Looking over hospital equipment on a conducted tour through buildings at Newell, Calif., Thursday, were representatives of Modoc, Siskiyou and Klamath county health groups.

Records of hospital equipment were examined and the equipment in the buildings was looked over. Joe Thomas, liaison officer for the U. S. bureau of reclamation, conducting the tour, said the group was very pleased with the material.

Some discussion on distribution of major pieces of equipment was held and Thomas said that next Tuesday a complete division of the property will be made. Modoc and Klamath counties will get their share immediately afterward and Tulelake's share will be stored by the USBR for one year or until Tulelake has its hospital or a building to store equipment.
