Newby Signs Truck Bill

SALEM, March 25 (AP)—Secretary of State Earl T. Newby today "reluctantly" signed a new agreement with Idaho governing reciprocity on the subject of motor vehicles between the two states.

Before the new agreement, each state granted free licenses to trucks of the other state. This agreement provides that trucks of more than 4500 pounds in one state shall have to be licensed by the other state.

Newby said this means that a large truck and trailer combination from Oregon will have to pay \$500 for a license when it enters Idaho. He said an Idaho truck and trailer combination entering Oregon can be licensed for only \$5.

Reciprocity for trucks under 4500 pounds and for farm trucks and other classes of motor vehicles will be continued.

In a letter to the Idaho state public utilities commission, Newby said:

"In wiping out even a portion of reciprocity, I fear we have opened the door to needless future misunderstandings, further burden on our policing activities and a general economic loss to business and industry."

But Newby said he felt that he had to sign the agreement in order to keep reciprocity for the farmer and small truck owner.

Admiral Reeves Passes At 75

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Adm. Joseph M. Reeves, 75, veteran of three wars and the father of the navy's Sunday punch carrier task force, died Thursday.

He entered Bethesda Naval hospital Monday for treatment of a heart condition.

The last admiral to wear a beard, he shed old navy customs and traditions in his battle planning. At a time when "battleship admirals" were undisputed bosses of the navy, he began the coordination of planes and ships that later grew into the fast carrier task force spearhead of World War II Pacific victories.

Snow Survey Unit Keeps Silent

MEDFORD, March 26 (AP)—The snow surveyors who are journeying through the Cascade mountains on a snow tractor haven't been heard from since Wednesday morning, W. T. Frost said Thursday.

Frost, in charge of snow surveys in Oregon, said there was no cause for alarm, however. He said the party is equipped for an eight-day period, and probably is merely too busy bucking fresh snow to send radio reports.

The surveyors, experimenting with the snow tractor trip instead of the traditional ski travel, are measuring snow courses to estimate the probable irrigation water supply.

Dane Troops Asked For Holy Land

JERUSALEM, March 26 (AP)—The Jewish agency proposed today that 10,000 Danish and Norwegian troops now stationed in Germany be assigned to Jerusalem to keep order after the British mandate ends on May 15.

An agency spokesman said: "If something of this sort is done it will ensure that Jerusalem at least will be taken out of the conflict area, no matter what measures may or may not be taken in respect to other Palestine areas."

"It is our duty to warn the world that what may happen in Jerusalem through no fault of the Jews if something is not done soon."

The Jewish agency is official spokesman for the Holy Land's Jews and official Jewish adviser to the British mandate government.

A spokesman added: "We are not wedded to the idea of using these particular troops. It is not our responsibility, but for the United Nations to determine which troops should be sent here."

A British authority in London questioned whether Denmark and Norway would be willing to send troops to the Middle East at a time of worry at home. Britain plans to give up the League of Nations mandate over Palestine May 15, and to move all British troops from Palestine by August 1. Evacuation operations already are under way.

The Jewish agency proposal has been forwarded to the UN, an agency spokesman said.

Power Member Is Aim Of Groups

SEATTLE, March 26 (AP)—A Pacific Northwest member of the federal power commission is the goal of Washington public power groups. President Truman will be asked to bring this about in filling the existing vacancy.

The drive for a Pacific Northwest commission member was announced today by Bert Heggen of La Center, president of the Washington Public Utility Commissioners association. He will appeal to Senator Warren G. Magnuson and Rep. Henry M. Jackson to approach the president.

Activity among PFC candidates was spurred by refusal of the post earlier this week by former Senator James Mead of New York.

New Trial Slated In Murder Case

OLYMPIA, March 26 (AP)—Harold Theodore Brent, convicted of second degree murder for the slaying of Donald Caldwell near Oak Harbor August 17, 1946, is going to have a new trial.

In a 5-3 decision, the state supreme court today reversed an earlier decision by a department of the high tribunal. In so doing, the entire court upheld the island county superior court which had ruled Brent should have a new trial.

The decision by the department of the supreme court was issued last July. The case was reheard by the entire court.

New Columbia Span To Be Started

OLYMPIA, March 26 (AP)—Construction will be started this year on a new bridge across the Columbia river at Wenatchee, a state highway department spokesman said today.

"The money is available," said E. L. Massey, chief accountant for the department. "We plan to call for construction bids sometime in June."

Earlier this month it was disclosed that the department had applied to the army engineers corps for a one-year extension in time for starting construction. The previous permit, which the engineers' corps granted from the standpoint of navigation, called for construction to start by today.

Tax Refunds Near Intake Figure

TACOMA, March 26 (AP)—Refunds to income tax payers in the Washington-Alaska district this year are almost equal to the total income taxes collected in the district during the year of 1947.

Internal Revenue Collector Clark Squire said today that 239,469 refunds totaling \$11,644,891 have been made thus far this year. Income taxes collected in 1947 totaled \$12,072,207.

France To Get Painting Back

HAMBURG, Germany, March 26 (AP)—Fifty paintings recovered from the loot of Joachim von Ribbentrop, Nazi foreign minister, will be returned to France next month. A British military officer said most of the works came from the Rothschild collection. They include paintings by Corot, Courbet and Monet.

Stassen Hopeful Of Good Support

CHICAGO, March 26 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen predicted Thursday he will get the votes of 230 delegates on the first ballot of the republican national convention.

He made his estimate at a news conference at the opening of Illinois headquarters in his campaign for the republican presidential nomination. A total of 547 convention votes will be needed to nominate.

Long-Range Bombing Is Ready To Go

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—The air forces advised congress Thursday its long-range heavy bombers can take off from Alaska, "bomb any part of Russia and return to American bases."

Secretary of Air Sylvanting, testifying to the senate armed services committee, discussed long range bombing power.

He joined other leaders of the armed forces in urging an immediate expansion of their strength, a draft and universal military training.

Sylvanting spoke of Russia by way of example after saying that present air strength of "53 combat groups" is in "fairly good shape but at peacetime strength, feeble in contrast to our World War II strength of 343 fully manned groups, but nonetheless a nucleus for an air force in being."

He said an improved version of the B-29 heavy bombers now has a "radius action of over 2000 miles."

He said combining this new long range bomber with the "most modern development of refueling technique which we developed some years ago" would allow "limited operations" to "bomb any part of Russia."

Trio Held For Rescue Try

PORTLAND, March 26 (AP)—Three youths were in custody today, accused of aiding a thwarted rescue attempt to "rescue" a girl friend who refused to be "rescued."

Three young men burst into the girls' juvenile detention home here Monday night and forced their way into the dormitory at gunpoint, saying they were going to "rescue" a girl friend.

The 14-year-old girl, however, spoiled it all by refusing to come. Police arrested Edward Milligan, 19, at Monmouth and Donald Logan, 18, at Roseburg, in connection with the attempt, and a third accused youth, Richard Culkins, 21, was turned in by relatives.

Meanwhile William Oscar Milligan, 21, who police said planned the elope attempt, sat glumly in a cell here and declared he still hoped to marry the 14-year-old girl. "She's the only girl I ever loved," he said.

NEW YORK, March 26 (AP)—Fairly good weather for New York's Easter parade was forecast today. There will be partly cloudy skies. But the weather bureau says it now appears no rain will fall on Easter Friday. Top temperature for the day is expected to be 50 degrees.
